WEDNESDAY, 27 MARCH 1968

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Calwell presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House take any action necessary to assist a campaign for a lasting peaceful settlement in Vietnam.

Petition received and read.

- Mr Buchanan presented a petition from certain electors of the Commonwealth praying that the well-being of the aged, the infirm, the widowed, the deserted wives and dependent children, and the service pensioner be improved to parity with the national general living standard of the Australian people. Petition received.
- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Gorton (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the forthcoming absence abroad of himself, Mr McEwen (Minister for Trade and Industry) would act as Prime Minister. Mr Gorton also informed the House that, during the forthcoming absence abroad of Mr Hasluck (Minister for External Affairs), Mr Freeth (Minister for Air) would act as Minister for External Affairs.
- 4 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 5 PAPER: Mr Speaker presented the following paper:

6 COMMONWEALTH DROUGHT ASSISTANCE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr McMahon (Treasurer), by leave, made a ministerial statement outlining what the Government is doing to help alleviate problems in those States affected by drought, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

- 7 INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON HUMAN RIGHTS, TEHERAN, 1968—AUSTRALIAN DELE-GATION—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Hasluck (Minister for External Affairs), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House that Australia would be represented at the International Conference on Human Rights, one of the major international events associated with the International Year for Human Rights, to be held in Teheran during April-May this year. The Australian Delegation would be led by Mr Bowen (Attorney-General) and, with other persons, would include two Members of the Commonwealth Parliament, Senator Murphy (Leader of the Opposition in the Senate) and Mr Peacock.

- 9 COMMONWEALTH PARLIAMENTARY ASSOCIATION—THIRTEENTH COMMONWEALTH PARLIA-MENTARY CONFERENCE—REPORT OF DELEGATION FROM COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA BRANCH—PAPER NOTED: Mr Davies, by leave, presented the following paper:

- (b) by adding at the end thereof the following sub-section:— (11.) This section shall continue in force for a period of
 - twelve months from the date of its commencement and no longer.'.".

Mr Freeth moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

15 STATES GRANTS (SCIENCE LABORATORIES) BILL 1968: Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States for Science Laboratories and Equipment in Schools. Bill read a first time.

Mr Fraser moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

16 NEW SOUTH WALES GRANT (FLOOD MITIGATION) BILL 1968: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time-

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr C. K. Jones), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

17 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Freeth (Minister for Air) moved—That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.
