WEDNESDAY, 19 MARCH 1969

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITION: Mr Cope presented a petition from certain citizens of the Australian Capital Territory praying that this House give earnest consideration, during Human Rights Year, to the crisis in education in Australia.
 Petition received.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 BROADCASTING AND TELEVISION ACT—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Hulme (Postmaster-General), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House that the Government had decided to bring down legislation to correct a shortcoming in the Broadcasting and Television Act relating to the ownership and control of television stations.
- 5 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—POVERTY IN AUSTRALIA: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The Government's failure to undertake a survey into the extent, distribution, causes and effects of poverty in Australia, to marshal adequate administrative and financial resources for a campaign to eliminate poverty and to encourage participation in that campaign among all sections of the community".
 The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—
 Mr Whitlam addressed the House.
 Discussion ensued.
 Discussion concluded.
- 6 UNIVERSITIES (FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1969: Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to amend section 11 of the *Universities (Financial Assistance) Act 1966-1968*.
 Bill read a first time.
 Mr Fraser moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
 Debate adjourned (Mr Whitlam—Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 7 RAW COTTON BOUNTY BILL 1969: Mr Anthony (Minister for Primary Industry), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Raw Cotton Bounty Act 1963-1968*.
 Bill read a first time.
 Mr Anthony moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
 Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 8 CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION BILL (NO. 2) 1969: Mr Bowen (Attorney-General), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to Increase by one the Maximum Number of Judges of the Commonwealth Industrial Court.
 Bill read a first time.
 Mr Bowen moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
 Debate adjourned (Mr Connor), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY: Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 and 2, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.

10 PUBLIC SERVICE ARBITRATION BILL 1969: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Mr Speaker announced the receipt of message No. 111, dated 5 March 1969, from His Excellency the Governor-General recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole.

Mr Webb, by leave, moved the following amendments together:

Clause 8—

Page 5, line 18, omit “Subject to the next succeeding sub-section.”.

Page 5, proposed section 12A, omit sub-section (3.).

Clause 10, page 6, lines 2 and 3, omit “Subject to sub-section (3.) of section twelve A of this Act.”.

Clause 12, page 7, proposed section 15AA, omit sub-section (4.).

Clause 13, page 8, lines 1–5, omit paragraph (b).

Debate ensued.

Question—That the amendments be agreed to—put.

Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Lucock reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Bury (Minister for Labour and National Service), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

11 SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS—BILLS ASSOCIATED WITH THE PUBLIC SERVICE ARBITRATION BILL: Mr Bury (Minister for Labour and National Service) moved, by leave—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent orders of the day Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 7 for the resumption of the debate on the second reading of the Commonwealth Employees' Compensation Bill, the Conciliation and Arbitration Bill, the Officers' Rights Declaration Bill and the Superannuation Bill being read together and a motion being moved that the Bills be now passed.

Question—put and passed.

12 COMMONWEALTH EMPLOYEES' COMPENSATION, CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION, OFFICERS' RIGHTS DECLARATION, AND SUPERANNUATION BILLS 1969: The orders of the day for the resumption of the debate on the second reading of the several Bills having been read together—

Mr Bury (Minister for Labour and National Service) moved—That the Bills be now passed.

Question—put and passed.

13 R.A.A.F. MIRAGE AIRCRAFT MISSING IN SINGAPORE AREA—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr G. D. Erwin (Minister for Air), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House that a Mirage aircraft of No. 75 Squadron of the Royal Australian Air Force and its pilot were last night reported missing in the Singapore area. An intensive search was being conducted and a Court of Inquiry had been convened.

14 HOME CARE PROGRAMME FOR THE AGED—COMMONWEALTH OFFER TO STATES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PAPER NOTED: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Forbes (Minister for Health)—That the House take note of the paper (*presented on 26 February 1969*), viz.:

Home care programme for the aged—Commonwealth offer to States—Ministerial statement, 26 February 1969—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed.

15 ADJOURNMENT: Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Mr Daly, who had already spoken, asked leave to address the House again.

Objection being raised, leave not granted.

Suspension of standing orders moved: Mr Calwell moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Daly from speaking again.

Privilege: Mr Calwell raised a matter of privilege with respect to allegations based on a news sheet which grossly reflected on the character of the Prime Minister, and moved—That the matter be referred to the Committee of Privileges.

Mr Speaker stated that it was a matter for the Chair to determine whether a *prima facie* case of breach of privilege had been made out. At this stage he felt that a *prima facie* case had not been made out, but he would like time to consider the matter.
