- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petition: Mr Dobie presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Government make grants available to relieve the increased costs of educating children attending Catholic schools.
 Petition received and read.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 Public Accounts Committee—Reports—Statement by Member: Mr Cleaver (Chairman) brought up the following reports from the Joint Committee of Public Accounts:

 One hundred and eighth Report—Treasury Minute on the Thirty-fourth Report together with summary of that report;

One hundred and ninth Report—The Supplementary Report of the Auditor-General—Financial year 1967-68—

and, by leave, made a statement in connection with the reports.

Ordered—That the reports be printed.

5 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Webb had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The urgent necessity to achieve justice and goodwill in industry by providing effective conciliation machinery for the prevention and settlement of industrial disputes and by repealing the labour injunction and related contempt provisions of the present Conciliation and Arbitration Act".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Webb addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

6 Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Bill 1969: Mr Swartz (Minister assisting the Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Defence Forces Retirement Benefits Act* 1948–1968.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 Postponement of notices: Ordered—That notices Nos. 2 to 4, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.

8 AUGMENTATION OF SEWERAGE, NORTHERN AND CENTRAL ZONES, DARWIN—APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr Kelly (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913–1966, it is expedient to carry out the following work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the committee has duly reported to this House: Augmentation of sewerage in northern and central zones, Darwin.

Question-put and passed.

- 9 ORDER OF THE DAY No. 1—GRIEVANCE DEBATE: It being past fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m., order of the day No. 1 (Grievance debate—pursuant to standing order 106) was not called on.
- 10 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 3) 1968-69: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Bury (Minister for Labour and National Service), the Bill was read a third time.

- 11 Suspension of standing orders—Appropriation Bill (No. 4) and Supply Bills: Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent orders of the day Nos. 3, 4 and 5 for the resumption of the debate on the second reading of the Appropriation Bill (No. 4) 1968-69, the Supply Bill (No. 1) 1969-70 and the Supply Bill (No. 2) 1969-70 being read together and a motion being moved that the Bills be now passed. Question—put and passed.
- 12 APPROPRIATION BILL (No. 4) 1968-69, SUPPLY BILL (No. 1) 1969-70 AND SUPPLY BILL (No. 2) 1969-70: The orders of the day for the resumption of the debate on the second reading of the several Bills having been read together—

Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House) moved—That the Bills be now passed. Question—put and passed.

13 MEAT CHICKEN LEVY BILL 1969: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Nixon (Minister for the Interior), the Bill was read a third time.

14 MEAT CHICKEN LEVY COLLECTION BILL 1969: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

Mr Patterson, by leave, moved the following amendments together:

Clause 8, page 3, at the end of sub-clause (2.) add "within twelve months of the alleged offence".

Clause 9, page 3, lines 3-5, omit "For the purposes of this Act, a person authorized in writing by the Minister to exercise powers under this section may, at all reasonable times and on production of that authority", insert "For the purposes of this Act, when it is believed that an offence has been committed, a person authorized in writing by the Minister to exercise powers under this section may apply to a Justice of the Peace for the granting of a search warrant authorizing him, at all reasonable times and on production of that authority to".

Debate ensued.

Question—That the amendments be agreed to—put.
