WEDNESDAY, 13 AUGUST 1969

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable W. J. Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petition: Mr Calwell presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the House act immediately to assure Wilfred Burchett and his family of their freedom to enter and leave Australia and restore the Australian passport to Wilfred Burchett.

Petition received and read.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 PAPERS: Mr Speaker presented the following paper:

Presiding Officers and Clerks of the Parliaments of Australia, Papua and New Guinea, New Zealand, Fiji, Nauru and Western Samoa—Report of Second Conference, Parliament House, Brisbane, 8 to 10 April 1969.

The following paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General:

Passport application by Mr W. G. Burchett—Copies of letters, dated 13 April and 16 May 1956, from the Minister for Immigration (Mr Holt) to the General Secretary, Australian Council of Civil Liberties (Mr B. Fitzpatrick), and letter, dated 31 March 1967, from Mr W. G. Burchett to the Prime Minister (Mr Holt).

- 5 ADVANCE TO THE TREASURER 1968-69—STATEMENT OF EXPENDITURE: Mr McMahon (Treasurer), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:
 - Advance to the Treasurer for year 1968-69—Statement of heads of expenditure and the amounts charged thereto pursuant to section 36A of the *Audit Act* 1901-1969.
 - Ordered—That the statement be taken into consideration in committee of the whole House at the next sitting.
- 6 EDUCATION—INCREASED COMMONWEALTH ASSISTANCE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), by leave, made a ministerial statement with reference to the Government's proposals to increase assistance for education by making per capita grants to independent schools throughout Australia, reviewing its policy on teacher education and increasing the number of Commonwealth tertiary scholarships, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Education—Increased Commonwealth assistance—Ministerial statement, 13 August 1969.

- Mr G. D. Erwin (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Debate ensued.
- Debate adjourned (Mr Chaney), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 7 Public Works Committee—Resignation of member: Mr Speaker informed the House that he had received a letter from Mr O'Connor resigning his seat on the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works.
- 8 Public Works Committee—Report: Mr Chaney (Chairman) brought up the following report from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works:

Report relating to the proposed construction of a Rehabilitation Centre, Glen Waverley, Vic. (Sixth report of 1969).

Ordered to be printed.

9 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—DROUGHT MITIGATION: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Patterson had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Federal Government throughout its 20 years of office to implement an effective drought mitigation programme to minimise economic losses in established areas which are highly susceptible to devastating droughts".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Patterson addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

10 AUGMENTATION OF DARWIN WATER SUPPLY—APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr Kelly (Minister representing the Minister for Works) moved, pursuant to notice—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act* 1913–1966, it is expedient to carry out the following proposed work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the committee has duly reported to this House: Augmentation of water supply, Darwin.

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

11 SULPHURIC ACID BOUNTY BILL 1969: Mr Nixon (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Sulphuric Acid Bounty Act 1954-1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 PYRITES BOUNTY BILL 1969: Mr Nixon (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Pyrites Bounty Act* 1960–1965.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 CELLULOSE ACETATE FLAKE BOUNTY BILL 1969: Mr Nixon (Minister representing the Minister for Customs and Excise), by leave, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Cellulose Acetate Flake Bounty Act 1956-1966.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Nixon moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr J. F. Cairns), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 MAPPING SURVEYS BILL 1969: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Fairbairn (Minister for National Development), the Bill was read a third time.

- 15 Suspension of standing orders—Motion without notice: Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent a motion being moved that the Minister for Air should withdraw his statement that the honourable Member for Reid was asking questions in this House which were led off by the Russian Embassy and should either withdraw or prove it.
 - Question—put and passed, with the concurrence of an absolute majority.
- 16 STATEMENT BY MINISTER FOR AIR CONCERNING HONOURABLE MEMBER FOR REID: Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) moved—That the Minister for Air should withdraw his statement that the honourable Member for Reid was asking questions in this House which were led off by the Russian Embassy and should either withdraw or prove it.

Debate ensued.

Point of order: A point of order having been raised by Mr Calwell that the remark of Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services) that the Australian Labor Party had acted under the influence of the Russian Communists was offensive and should be withdrawn—

Speaker's ruling: Mr Speaker ruled that remarks which may be undesirable are not unparliamentary when applied to a whole Party where Members cannot be identified.

Dissent from ruling: Mr Whitlam moved—That the ruling be dissented from.

Debate ensued on the motion of dissent.

Question—That the ruling be dissented from—put.
