THURSDAY, 16 APRIL 1970

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Fox presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the export of all kangaroo products be banned immediately.
  - Petition received and read.

A similar petition was presented by Mr Whittorn, and was received.

Mr Hughes (Attorney-General) presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Berowra praying that the Australian Government take positive action as soon as possible to re-establish confidence in the Commonwealth arbitration system.

Petition received and read.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Hughes was presented by Mr Dobie, from certain electors of the Division of Cook, and was received.
- Mr Sherry presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) a joint Commonwealth-State inquiry into inequalities in Australian education, (2) the immediate financing of special programmes for low income earners and others and (3) the provision of pre-school opportunities for all children.

Petition received and read.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Sherry was presented by Mr Duthie, and was received.
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH ASSISTANCE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Bowen (Minister for Education and Science), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of Commonwealth assistance to educational research and of the formation of the Australian Advisory Committee on Research and Development in Education. Mr Beazley, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 5 PAPER: Mr Jarman, by leave, presented the following paper:
  - Australian Parliamentary Mission—Report of visit to Hong Kong, Japan, the Republic of Korea and the Republic of China of mission led by Senator the Honourable R. C. Wright, Minister for Works and Minister in charge of Tourist Activities, 19 June to 9 July 1969.
- 6 GRIEVANCE DEBATE: Pursuant to the provisions of standing order 106, the order of the day having been read—

Question proposed—That grievances be noted.

Debate ensued.

It being fifteen minutes to one o'clock p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 106.

- 7 DAYS AND HOURS OF SITTING—ADJOURNMENT OF SITTING: Mr Snedden (Leader of the House) moved, by leave—
  - That until the end of June, unless otherwise ordered, the House shall meet for the despatch of business (a) on each Tuesday and Wednesday at two o'clock p.m. and on each Thursday at ten o'clock a.m., and (b) on and from Friday, 8 May, on each Friday at ten o'clock a.m.
  - (2) That until the end of June, at eleven o'clock p.m. on each Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and at four o'clock p.m. on Friday the Speaker shall put the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate; if the House be in committee at that hour, the Chairman shall report progress and upon such report being made the Speaker shall forthwith put the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate.

Provided that:

- (a) if a division be in progress at the time of interruption such division shall be completed and the result announced,
- (b) if, on the question—That the House do now adjourn—being proposed, a Minister requires the question to be put forthwith without debate, the Speaker shall forthwith put the question,
- (c) nothing in this order shall operate to prevent a motion for the adjournment of the House being moved by a Minister at an earlier hour,
- (d) any business under discussion and not disposed of at the time of the adjournment shall be set down on the Notice Paper for the next sitting, and
- (e) if the question—That the House do now adjourn—is negatived, the House shall resume the proceedings at the point at which they had been interrupted.
