THURSDAY, 3 SEPTEMBER 1970

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Werriwa praying that the House seek to ensure that Commonwealth legislation bearing on censorship of films, literature and radio and television programmes is so framed and so administered as to preserve sound moral standards in the community.

Petition received and read.

- Similar petitions were presented by Mr L. R. Johnson, from certain electors of the Division of Hughes, and by Mr Robinson, from certain electors of New South Wales, and were severally received.
- Mr Bennett presented a petition from certain citizens of Western Australia praying that the House consider the hardship caused to home buyers in that State by the increased interest rates on mortgage contracts which result from the recent increase in the interest rate on Government bonds.
- Mr Jenkins presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) a joint Commonwealth-State inquiry into inequalities in Australian education, (2) the immediate financing of special programmes for low income earners and others and (3) the provision of pre-school opportunities for all children.

Petitions severally received and read.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Jenkins was presented by Mr L. R. Johnson, and was received.
- Mr Enderby presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) the allowance of personal education expenses as a taxation deduction, (2) the removal of the present age limit in respect of the deduction for education expenses, (3) an increase in the deduction allowable for tertiary education expenses, (4) an increase in the maintenance allowance for students and (5) the exemption of non-bonded scholarships for part-time students from income tax.

Petition received and read.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Enderby was presented by Mr Keogh, and was received.
- Mr L. R. Johnson presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

Mr Fox presented a petition from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the export of all kangaroo products be banned immediately.

Petitions severally received and read.

- Mr Whittorn presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the export of products made from kangaroos be banned and the Commonwealth Government take necessary steps to have all wildlife in Australia brought under its control. Petition received.

6 POST AND TELEGRAPH BILL 1970: Mr Hulme (Postmaster-General), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Post and Telegraph Act* 1901–1968 in relation to the Registration of Newspapers for Postal Purposes and to amend certain Regulations under that Act.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Hulme moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Crean), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 7 POSTPONEMENT OF NOTICES: Ordered—That notices Nos. 2 and 3, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 8 SOCIAL SERVICES BILL (No. 2) 1970: Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Social Services Act 1947-1969, as amended by the Social Services Act 1970. Bill read a first time.

Mr Wentworth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

9 REPATRIATION BILL (No. 2) 1970: Mr Holten (Minister for Repatriation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Repatriation Act* 1920–1969, as amended by the *Repatriation Act* 1970, so as to provide for Increases in the Rates of certain Pensions and Allowances and for additional Repatriation Boards and to appropriate the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the purpose of certain Payments resulting from those amendments.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Holten moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

- Debate adjourned (Mr Barnard—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 10 SEAMEN'S WAR PENSIONS AND ALLOWANCES BILL 1970: Mr Holten (Minister for Repatriation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Seamen's War Pensions and Allowances Act 1940-1969 so as to provide for Increases in the Rates of certain Pensions and Allowances and for matters connected therewith. Bill read a first time.

Mr Holten moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Barnard—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
