### TUESDAY, 13 OCTOBER 1970

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DISTINGUISHED VISITOR: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Jose B. Laurel Jnr, Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the Philippines, was within the precincts. The distinguished visitor thereupon, with the concurrence of honourable Members, was provided with a seat on the floor of the House.
- 3 Petitions: Mr Peacock (Minister for the Army) presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Higgins praying that the Government give full, prompt and unbiased consideration to the air bus proposal of Mr Peter Wood which is directed at reducing air fares by the establishment of a cheap system of air transport to be based on a suitable, locally made, two-engined aircraft.
  - Mr McIvor presented a petition from certain citizens of Victoria praying that this House take immediate steps to increase the base pension rate to 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings.
  - Mr Fox presented a petition from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the export of all kangaroo products be banned immediately.

Petitions severally received and read.

Laurel Jnr was joint leader of a delegation from the Congress of the Philippines and that other members of the delegation were now present in the gallery of the House.
