HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY, 18 AUGUST 1971

1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2 PETITIONS: Mr Klugman presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the sales tax and customs duties on all forms of contraceptive devices be removed, and that all contraceptive devices be placed on the National Health Scheme Pharmaceutical Benefits list.

Petition received and read.

A similar petition was presented by Mr Calwell, and was received.

Mr Reynolds presented a petition from certain electors of Australia praying that the Government revise its interpretation of the Geneva Protocol of 1925 relating to chemical agents of warfare, and declare that it regards all chemical substances employed for their toxic effects on man, animals or plants, as being included in the prohibitions laid down by that Protocol.

Petition received and read.

A similar petition to that presented by Mr Reynolds was presented by Mr Luchetti, and was received.

Mr Enderby presented a petition from certain residents of the Australian Capital Territory praying that a Committee of Inquiry, on which are represented the Department of Education and Science, institutions of tertiary education, practising educators, and the Canberra community, be instituted to inquire into the form that an Australian Capital Territory Education Authority should take, the educational principles and philosophy that should underly it, and its mode of operation and administration.

Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) the allowance of personal education expenses as a taxation deduction, (2) the removal of the present age limit in respect of the deduction for education expenses, (3) an increase in the deduction allowable for tertiary education expenses, (4) an increase in the maintenance allowance for students and (5) the exemption of non-bonded scholarships for part-time students from income tax.

Petitions severally received and read.

Similar petitions to that presented by Mr Barnard were presented by Mr Crean, Mr Webb and Mr Keating, and were severally received.

Mr Hamer presented a petition from certain residents of Victoria praying that the Commonwealth Government will take immediate steps to include qualified psychologists in the National Health Scheme.

Mr Cass presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House take immediate steps to ensure that emergency finance from the Commonwealth will be given to the States for their public education services which provide schooling for 78 per cent of Australia's children.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Scholes presented a petition from certain citizens of Victoria praying that this House take immediate steps to increase the base pension rate to 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings.

MR SPEAKER,

Message No. 175

Pursuant to a Resolution passed this day the Senate transmits to the House of Representatives the following Resolution agreed to by the Senate on 16 March 1971 during consideration of the Bill for "An Act to grant Financial Assistance to the State of New South Wales for the purpose of Flood Mitigation Works in relation to certain Rivers":

"That this Bill be now read a second time, but the Senate whilst welcoming the proposal for the purpose of flood mitigation works in New South Wales, is of the opinion that the assistance offered is inadequate and should form part of a larger scheme to deal with national disasters and that, accordingly, a joint select committee of the Parliament should be appointed to inquire into the practicability of the establishment of a national disaster organisation."

10 FOREIGN AFFAIRS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr N. H. Bowen (Minister for Foreign Affairs), by leave, made a ministerial statement on foreign affairs, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

11 Jervis Bay nuclear power station project—Ministerial Statement—Motion to Take note of paper: Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the Government's deferment of a decision on the proposal to construct Australia's first nuclear power station at Jervis Bay, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

Jervis Bay nuclear power station project—Ministerial statement, 18 August 1971. Mr Garland (Minister for Supply) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Mr Stewart moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "a select committee of this House be appointed to inquire into and report on the uses of nuclear power in relation to—

- (a) the projected power needs of the Commonwealth,
- (b) the comparative advantage derived from generating power in this way as against all other sources now being employed,
- (c) the effects of the establishment of a nuclear power station upon the environment,

- (d) administrative procedures and regulations adopted elsewhere to lessen any undesirable effects of the operation of such a station to ensure the utmost protection of members of the public and the national interest,
- (e) the desirability of establishing a nuclear power station at this time pending the outcome of further technological developments taking place elsewhere and
- (f) any related matter".

Debate continued.

Mr Bate was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—PEACE IN THE INDIAN SUB-CONTINENT—NEED FOR AUSTRALIAN INITIATIVES: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Beazley had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The need for Australian initiatives to assist the cause of peace in the Indian sub-continent".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Beazley addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

14 ADJOURNMENT: Mr N. H. Bowen (Minister for Foreign Affairs) moved—That the House do now adjourn.
