## THURSDAY, 9 SEPTEMBER 1971

- 1 The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Hurford presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Adelaide praying that section twenty-six of the National Service Act be repealed.

Petition received and read.

Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Jones and Mr O'Keefe presented petitions from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the sales tax and customs duties on all forms of contraceptive devices be removed, and that all contraceptive devices be placed on the National Health Scheme Pharmaceutical Benefits list.

Petitions severally received.

Mr Bennett presented a petition from certain residents of the Australian Capital Territory praying that a Committee of Inquiry, on which are represented the Department of Education and Science, institutions of tertiary education, practising educators, and the Canberra community, be instituted to inquire into the form that an Australian Capital Territory Education Authority should take, the educational principles and philosophy that should underly it, and its mode of operation and administration.

Petition received and read.

- Mr O'Keefe presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House take appropriate steps to procure the repeal of, or to nullify the effect of *The Aborigines' and Torres Strait Islanders' Affairs Act* 1965.
- Mr Kennedy presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that this House make legal provision for (1) a joint Commonwealth-State inquiry into inequalities in Australian education, (2) the immediate financing of special programmes for low income earners and others and (3) the provision of pre-school opportunities for all children.

8 SOUTH AUSTRALIA GRANT (FRUIT CANNERIES) BILL 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make provision for the grant of Financial Assistance to the State of South Australia to enable that State to make Loans to Jon Preserving Co-operative Limited and Riverland Fruit Products Co-operative Limited.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 New South Wales Grant (Leeton Co-operative Cannery Limited) Bill 1971: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make provision for the grant of Financial Assistance to the State of New South Wales to enable that State to make a Loan to Leeton Co-operative Cannery Limited.

11 WESTERN AUSTRALIA (SOUTH-WEST REGION WATER SUPPLIES) AGREEMENT BILL 1971:

Mr Peacock (Minister assisting the Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Western Australia (South-west Region Water Supplies)

Agreement Act 1965.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Peacock moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

12 Social Services Bill (No. 2) 1971: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Hayden who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "while not opposing the Bill, the House is of opinion that—

(1) the increases proposed are inadequate,

(2) social service payments generally are inadequate to maintain an acceptable standard of living,

(3) steps should be taken immediately to eliminate poverty,

- (4) a national superannuation system should be established and the means test eliminated,
- (5) pension payments should be a proportion of average weekly earnings adjusted annually and
- (6) a joint select committee should be established to inquire into and report upon the social welfare needs of the Australian community".

Suspension of standing orders moved—Motion without notice: Mr Hayden moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent the honourable Member for Oxley moving a motion for the appointment forthwith of a select committee of this House to inquire into and report upon Australian proposals and overseas practices in relation to a national superannuation scheme.
