HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

No. 160

TUESDAY, 28 MARCH 1972

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), Mr Solomon and Mr Morrison each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that this House will (1) take immediate steps to make emergency finance available to the States for State school education and (2) divert the large sums of public money being spent on private schools to the government school system for which the Government is truly responsible.
 - Mr Enderby presented a petition from certain citizens of the Australian Capital Territory praying that the words "or for preventing conception" be deleted from sub-section (1.) of section 46 of the A.C.T. Pharmacy Ordinance.
 - Mr L. F. Bowen presented a petition from certain electors of the Division of Kingsford-Smith praying that (1) the curfew between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. at Sydney (Kingsford-Smith) Airport be rigidly enforced, (2) the use of Electra aircraft and/or jet aircraft be prohibited within the curfew hours, (3) concessional airport charges be granted to encourage aircraft operators to use their aircraft during normal business hours and (4) a social survey be taken of the area surrounding the Airport to indicate the magnitude of unrest and disturbance attributable to aircraft noise.
 - Mr Enderby also presented a petition from certain residents of the Australian Capital Territory praying that a committee of inquiry, on which are represented the Department of Education and Science, institutions of tertiary education, practising educators, and the Canberra community, be instituted to inquire into the form that an Australian Capital Territory Education Authority should take, the educational principles and philosophy that should underly it, and its mode of operation and administration.

Mr Bennett presented a petition from certain residents of Western Australia praying that this House take immediate steps to ensure provision of funds to provide for the all-weather sealing of the Eyre Highway.

Mr J. M. Fraser (Minister for Education and Science), Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development), Mr Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition), Mr Katter (Minister for the Army), Mr Mackay (Minister for the Navy), Mr Jones, Sir John Cramer, Mr Duthie, Sir Charles Adermann, Mr Griffiths, Mr England, Mr G. D. Erwin, Mr Armitage, Mr Solomon, Mr Keogh, Mr Grassby, Mr Drury, Mr L. F. Bowen, Mr Whittorn, Mr Scholes, Mr Luchetti and Mr Everingham each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House will take immediate steps to call a halt to the closing of post offices and the reorganisation of the Post Office and initiate a joint parliamentary inquiry into the Postmaster-General's Department.

Mr Foster, Mr Cope, Mr James and Mr McIvor each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will immediately enact legislation providing for a base pension rate of 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings and other health and social service changes and initiate a public inquiry into Australia's social welfare structure.

Petitions severally received.

- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr McMahon (Prime Minister) informed the House that during the absence, owing to illness, of Sir Alan Hulme (Postmaster-General), Senator Cotton (Minister for Civil Aviation) was acting as Postmaster-General and Mr Lynch (Minister for Labour and National Service) would represent the Acting Postmaster-General in this House.

Mr Patterson moved, as an amendment—That the following words be added to the motion: "if a majority of wool growers affected decide by referendum or other fair means in favour of removing or relaxing the embargo".
