WEDNESDAY, 19 APRIL 1972

- 1 The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Sir William Aston) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services), Mr Everingham, Mr Sherry, Mr Jenkins, Mr Hansen, Mr Scholes, Mr Cass, Mr Stewart and Mr L. K. Johnson each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the Government will immediately enact legislation providing for a base pension rate of 30 per cent of average weekly male earnings and other health and social service changes and initiate a public inquiry into Australia's social welfare structure.
 - Mr Corbett, Mr Kennedy, Mr Lucock, Mr Everingham, Mr Kelly and Mr Hayden each presented a petition from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House will take immediate steps to call a halt to the closing of post offices and the reorganisation of the Post Office and initiate a joint parliamentary inquiry into the Postmaster-General's Department.
 - Mr Luchetti and Mr Klugman each presented a petition from certain residents of the western suburbs in the Sydney metropolitan area and surrounding districts praying that this House take appropriate steps to ensure that the Government does not proceed with the proposal to site the second twenty-four hour international airport for Sydney at Richmond or anywhere else in the far western suburbs of the metropolitan area.

Petitions severally received.

- A similar petition to that presented by Mr Luchetti was presented by Mr Armitage, and was received and read.
- Mr MacKellar presented a petition from certain citizens of the Commonwealth praying that the Federal Government take immediate steps to act on behalf of all Australian people to preserve Lake Pedder in its natural state.

Petition received.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 AUSTRALIAN FILM AND TELEVISION SCHOOL—ESTABLISHMENT—PAPERS AND MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPERS: Mr Howson (Minister for the Environment, Aborigines and the Arts), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following papers:

Mr Howson, by leave, made a ministerial statement relating to the papers and the establishment of the Australian Film and Television School, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

5 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—EXPLORATION OF OIL RESOURCES: Mr Deputy Speaker informed the House that both Mr Bonnett and Mr Patterson had proposed that definite matters of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion today. In accordance with the provisions of standing order 107, Mr Speaker had given priority to the matter proposed by Mr Patterson, namely, "The failure of the Government to implement positive policies to encourage and maintain the progressive exploration of Australian oil resources".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Patterson addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

6 DAIRYING INDUSTRY BILL 1972: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend section 5 of the *Dairying Industry Act* 1962-1970.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 PROCESSED MILK PRODUCTS BOUNTY BILL 1972: Mr Sinclair (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend section 3 of the *Processed Milk Products Bounty Act* 1962–1970.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Sinclair moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 SOFTWOOD FORESTRY AGREEMENTS BILL 1972: Mr Swartz (Minister for National Development), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Agreements between the Commonwealth and the States in connexion with Softwood Forestry.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Swartz moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Patterson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 SOCIAL SERVICES BILL (No. 2) 1972 [No. 2]: Mr Wentworth (Minister for Social Services), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to Social Services.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Wentworth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 210, dated 19 April 1972, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Wentworth, the Bill was read a third time.

10 REPATRIATION BILL 1972: Mr Holten (Minister for Repatriation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Repatriation Act 1920-1971 so as to provide for Increases in the Rates of certain Pensions payable to certain persons, and for purposes connected therewith, and to appropriate the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the purpose of certain payments resulting from those amendments.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Holten moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Leave granted for debate to ensue.

Mr Barnard (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "while not opposing the provisions of the Bill, the House condemns the Government's failure to restore the relative value of repatriation pensions, in particular the general rate pension".

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

11 SEAMEN'S WAR PENSIONS AND ALLOWANCES BILL 1972: Mr Holten (Minister for Repatriation), for Mr Nixon (Minister for Shipping and Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Seamen's War Pensions and Allowances Act 1940-1971 so as to provide for Increases in the Rates of certain Pensions.

Bill read a first time

Mr Holten moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question—put, by leave, and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Holten, the Bill was read a third time.

- 12 STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE—REPORT DATED 20 MARCH 1972—AMENDMENTS OF STANDING ORDERS AND CHANGES IN PRACTICE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Swartz (Leader of the House), as amended, viz.—
 - (a) That recommendations Nos. 1 to 10 contained in the report of the Standing Orders Committee dated 20 March 1972 be agreed to.
 - (b) That other decisions of the Committee Nos. 1 to 5 be endorsed, subject to decision No. 2 being referred back to the Committee for further consideration.
 - (c) That the amendments of the standing orders and changes of practice adopted by this resolution be effective from and including the next sitting—

And on the further amendment moved thereto by Mr Bryant, viz.—That after paragraph (b) the following paragraph be inserted:

"(ba) That the standing orders be amended by inserting after standing order 49 the following new standing order:

'49A. That, at 10 p.m. each sitting day, the Speaker shall put the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate; if the House be in committee at that hour, the Chairman shall in like manner put the question—That he do leave the Chair and report to the House; and upon such report being made the Speaker shall forthwith put the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate: Provided that if the House or the committee be in division at the time named, the Speaker or the Chairman shall not put the question referred to until the result of such division has been declared; and if the business under discussion shall not have been disposed of at such adjournment it shall appear on the Notice Paper for the next sitting day.'."—

Debate resumed.

Mr Luchetti moved, as an amendment to the proposed amendment—That the proposed new standing order be omitted with a view to inserting the following standing order in place thereof:

"49A. Unless otherwise ordered, at eleven o'clock p.m. on Tuesday and at half-past ten o'clock p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, the Speaker shall propose the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate; if the House be in committee at that hour, the Chairman shall report progress and upon such report being made the Speaker shall forthwith propose the question—That the House do now adjourn—which question shall be open to debate. Provided that:

- (a) if a division be in progress at the time of interruption such division shall be completed and the result announced,
- (b) if, on the question—That the House do now adjourn—being proposed, a Minister requires the question to be put forthwith without debate, the Speaker shall forthwith put the question,
- (c) nothing in this order shall operate to prevent a motion for the adjournment of the House being moved by a Minister at an earlier hour,
- (d) any business under discussion and not disposed of at the time of the adjournment shall be set down on the Notice Paper for the next sitting, and
- (e) if the question—That the House do now adjourn—is negatived, the House shall resume the proceedings at the point at which they had been interrupted.

Provided further that if, at twelve o'clock midnight, the question before the House is— That the House do now adjourn—the Speaker shall forthwith adjourn the House until the time of its next meeting.
