- 1 The House met, at two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable J. F. Cope) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petition: The Clerk announced that Mr Jarman had lodged a petition for presentation from certain citizens of Australia praying that the House oppose any liberalisation of the law on abortion beyond that which is permitted in Victoria at the present time. Petition received.
- 3 OUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 Papers: The following papers were presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General:

Commonwealth Superannuation—Departmental memorandum to the Prime Minister relating to his answer to a question without notice asked earlier in the day by the Hon. L. H. E. Bury, M.P.

Tariff Board—Report—Fibreboard—By-Law.

The following paper was presented, pursuant to statute:

Wheat Research Act—Fourteenth Annual Report, for 1971.

5 Income Tax (International Agreements) Bill 1973: Mr Hayden (Acting Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Income Tax* (*International Agreements*) Act 1953-1972.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Hayden moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hayden, the Bill was read a third time.

- 6 POSTPONEMENT OF NOTICE: Ordered—That notice No. 1, government business, be postponed until the next sitting.
- 7 STATES GRANTS (ADVANCED EDUCATION) BILL 1973: Mr Beazley (Minister for Education), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the States Grants (Advanced Education) Act (No. 3) 1972.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Beazley moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Lynch—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 STATES GRANTS (WATER RESOURCES MEASUREMENT) BILL 1973: Dr Cass (Minister for the Environment and Conservation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the States in connexion with the Measurement and Investigation of their Water Resources.

Bill read a first time.

Dr Cass moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Lynch—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 9 SOUTH AUSTRALIA GRANT (LOCK TO KIMBA PIPELINE) BILL 1973: Dr Cass (Minister for the Environment and Conservation), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant Financial Assistance to the State of South Australia in connexion with the Construction of a Pipeline from Lock to Kimba and of certain Associated Works. Bill read a first time.
 - Dr Cass moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
 - Debate adjourned (Mr Lynch—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
- 10 PRICES—PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Crean (Treasurer)—
 - (1) That a Joint Committee be appointed to inquire into and, as appropriate, report on—
 - (a) complaints arising from prices charged by private industry;
 - (b) movements in prices of goods and services in particular fields or sections of private industry, for example, as measured by price indices; and
 - (c) such other matters relating to prices as may be referred to the committee by resolution of either House of the Parliament.
 - (2) That the committee consist of four Members of the House of Representatives nominated by the Prime Minister, two Members of the House of Representatives nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the House of Representatives, one Member of the House of Representatives nominated by the Leader of the Australian Country Party in the House of Representatives, two Senators nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate and one Senator nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate.
 - (3) That every nomination of a member of the committee be forthwith notified in writing to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 - (4) That the members of the committee hold office as a joint committee until the House of Representatives expires by dissolution or effluxion of time.
 - (5) That the Prime Minister nominate one of the government members of the committee as Chairman.
 - (6) That the Chairman of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the Deputy Chairman of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as Chairman of the committee at any time when the Chairman is not present at a meeting of the committee.
 - (7) That the committee have power to appoint sub-committees consisting of three or more of its members and to refer to any such sub-committee any of the matters which the committee is empowered to examine.
 - (8) That the committee have power to send for persons, papers and records, to move from place to place and to sit during any recess or adjournment of the Parliament.
 - (9) That the committee have leave to report from time to time and that any member of the committee have power to add a protest or dissent to any report.
 - (10) That five members of the committee constitute a quorum of the committee, and two members of a sub-committee constitute a quorum of that sub-committee.
 - (11) That in matters of procedure the Chairman or Deputy Chairman presiding at the meeting have a deliberative vote and, in the event of an equality of voting, have a casting vote, and that, in other matters, the Chairman or Deputy Chairman have a deliberative vote only.
 - (12) That the committee be provided with all necessary staff, facilities and resources.
 - (13) That the committee recognise the need for co-operation between the Commonwealth and consumer protection bodies in the States.
 - (14) That the foregoing provisions of this resolution, so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.
 - (15) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and requesting that it concur and take action accordingly.

Debate resumed by Mr Lynch (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) who moved the following amendments together, by leave—

Paragraph (1)—

Sub-paragraph (a), after the words "private industry" add "and by the public sector".

Sub-paragraph (b), after the words "private industry" insert "and the public sector".

Debate continued.

Ordered—That Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition) be granted an extension of time. Debate continued.

Question—That the amendments be agreed to—put.

- 13 Public Service Bill 1973: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—Debate adjourned (Mr Lynch—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

14 Suspension of standing orders—Remuneration and Allowances Bill 1973: Mr Daly (Leader of the House) moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presenting a Remuneration and Allowances Bill 1973 forthwith.

15 REMUNERATION AND ALLOWANCES BILL 1973: Mr Whitlam (Prime Minister) presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Remuneration and Allowances payable to Members of the Parliament, Ministers of State, Justices of the High Court, Judges of Courts created by the Parliament, Permanent Heads of Departments of the Public Service and the Holders of certain Offices or Appointments.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Whitlam moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Mr Sinclair (Deputy Leader of the Australian Country Party) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to inserting the following words in place thereof: "while not opposing the passage of the Bill, the House is of opinion that the salary and allowances of the Leader of the Australian Country Party should be identical with those of the Deputy Leader of the Opposition".

Debate continued.

The debate having been closed by Mr Whitlam having spoken in reply—Mr Snedden (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, again addressed the House.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.
