Debate adjourned (Mr Wilson), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 NORTHERN TERRITORY SUPREME COURT BILL 1975: Mr Enderby (Attorney-General), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Northern Territory Supreme Court Act* 1961–1973.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Enderby moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Howard), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 Environment Protection (Impact of Proposals) Bill 1975: Dr Cass (Minister for Environment), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Environment Protection (Impact of Proposals) Act 1974.

Bill read a first time.

Dr Cass moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Dr Cass, the Bill was read a third time.

15 CHILDREN'S COMMISSION BILL 1975: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.

Page 3, paragraph (a), before sub-paragraph (i) insert the following sub-paragraph: "(ai) means of assistance to parents and guardians for assistance to children in their homes;".

Question—That the question be now put—put and negatived.

Debate continued.

Amendments negatived.
