Kalgoorlie to Port Augusta Proposed Railway-Information as to the character of the country adjacent to or through which the proposed railway would pass between latitude 30° S. and 32° S., and between longitude 125° E. and 131° E., comprising an area of 20,000,000 acres of grassy country. Ordered to lie on the Table.
