WEDNESDAY, 23 MARCH 1977

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DISTINGUISHED VISITOR: Mr Speaker informed the House that the Honourable Tupuola Efi, M.P., Prime Minister of Western Samoa, was within the precincts. With the concurrence of honourable Members, the distinguished visitor was provided with a seat on the floor of the House.
- 3 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Abel, Mr Armitage, Mr Baume, Mr Bradfield, Mr Ellicott, Mr Fife, Dr Klugman, Mr Lucock, Mr Neil, Mr I. L. Robinson, Mr Ruddock, Mr Sainsbury, Mr Sinclair and Mr Sullivan—from certain members of the Service Station Association of N.S.W. Ltd and others praying that in implementing the findings of the Royal Commission on Petroleum the needs of the motoring public and retail petroleum industry be given every consideration.
 - Mr Bonnett, Mr Braithwaite, Mr Goodluck, Mr McVeigh and Mr Porter—from certain citizens praying that the Government's long-term policy be to provide 50 per cent of funds for roads.
 - Mr Gillard, Dr Klugman, Mr W. McMahon, Mr I. L. Robinson and Mr Sinclair—from certain citizens praying that increases in the Consumer Price Index be applied to pensions and that future pensions be not reduced as a result of any revision of the Index.
 - Mr Bourchier and Mr Lloyd—from certain citizens praying that the Government totally finance national highways and provide half the cost of all other public roads.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that the zone allowance provisions in the Income Tax Assessment Act be varied.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that an Australian Broadcasting Commission television service be established at Moranbah, Qld.
 - Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the recommendations of the Committee of Inquiry into Public Libraries be implemented.
 - Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that the continuation and growth of symphony orchestras throughout Australia be ensured.

The presence in Australia of Your Majesty and of His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh has once again brought the greatest pleasure to Your Australian people. We, their representatives in this House, are grateful for the opportunity to re-affirm our allegiance to you as our Queen—
