## WEDNESDAY, 27 APRIL 1977

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable B. M. Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Bourchier, Mr Bradfield, Mr Falconer, Dr Klugman and Mr I. L. Robinsonfrom certain citizens praying that increases in the Consumer Price Index be applied to pensions and that future pensions not be reduced as a result of any revision of the Index.
  - Mr Bradfield and Mr Morris—from certain members of the Service Station Association of N.S.W. Ltd and others praying that in implementing the findings of the Royal Commission on Petroleum the needs of the motoring public and the retail petroleum industry be given every consideration.
  - Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that private clinics be prevented from performing abortions in the A.C.T. and that abortions not be financed through Medibank.
  - Mr Groom—from certain citizens praying for the implementation of the recommendations of the Nimmo Report which relate to assistance for air passengers travelling to and from King Island.
  - Mr Jarman—from certain citizens praying that the imperial system of weights and measures be restored.
  - Mr King—from certain citizens praying that the Government totally finance national highways and provide half the cost of all other public roads.
  - Mr Morris—from certain citizens praying that a system of double income tax on personal incomes not be introduced.

Petitions received.

- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—MIGRANT LANGUAGES—TEACHING: Mr Speaker informed the House that both Mr E. G. Whitlam (Leader of the Opposition) and Mr K. M. Cairns had proposed that definite matters of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion today. In accordance with the provisions of standing order 107, he had given priority to the matter proposed by Mr E. G. Whitlam, namely, "The Fraser Government's inaction on the teaching of migrant languages in schools".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support— Mr E. G. Whitlam addressed the House. Discussion ensued. Discussion concluded.

- 5 TERTIARY EDUCATION COMMISSION BILL 1977: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Bowen, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the provisions of the Bill, the House is of opinion that:
  - (a) the disadvantaged position of technical education in Australia be recognised and that adequate financial resources be made available to the technical sector to raise its standards to levels envisaged in the Kangan Report;
  - (b) further measures be taken to ensure that technical education in Australia is not further isolated from secondary education, and
  - (c) every effort be made to ensure full provision for the development of further education"—

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr Fisher), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.
