- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Peritions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Bowen, Mr L. R. Johnson and Mr J. L. McMahon—from certain citizens praying for the establishment of a fund whereby loans can be made to means tested pensioners for the necessary maintenance of their homes.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that the Citizens Band Radio service regulations be changed to permit an extended operating range.
 - Mr McVeigh—from certain citizens praying that representatives of the Rhodesian Parliament be invited to Australia.
 - Mr Simon—from certain citizens praying that the final decision on the mining of uranium be made through a voluntary referendum after a 12 month program of public education and debate.
 - Mr Wallis—from certain citizens of Whyalla, S.A., praying for the establishment of a replacement railway rolling stock industry at Whyalla together with such other projects as are recommended by the Premier's working party.
 - Mr Young—from certain citizens praying for the implementation of the recommendations of the Committee of Inquiry into Public Libraries.

6 International Labour Conference—62nd (Maritime) Session—Paper and Ministerial Statement: Mr Street (Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations), by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

8 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—HEALTH CARE COSTS: Mr Speaker informed the House that Dr Klugman had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The Government's failure to deal with the rising costs of health care".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support-

- 9 Suspension of standing orders—Sales Tax Bills: Mr Fife (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs), for Mr Sinclair (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in relation to the proceedings on any Sales Tax Bills, so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent—
 - (a) the presentation and the first readings of the Bills together;
 - (b) one motion being moved and one question being put in regard to, respectively, the second readings, the committee's report stage, and the third readings, of all the Bills together, and
 - (c) the consideration of all the Bills as a whole together in a committee of the whole. Question—put and passed.
- 10 TERRITORY AUTHORITIES (FINANCIAL PROVISIONS) BILL 1978: Mr E. L. Robinson (Minister for Finance) presented a Bill for an Act relating to moneys appropriated for the purposes of certain authorities of the Territories, the borrowing of moneys by such authorities and the liability of such authorities to taxation.

Bill read a first time.

Mr E. L. Robinson moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Dr Klugman), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 Control of Naval Waters Amendment Bill 1978: Mr McLeay (Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Control of Naval Waters Act 1918, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr McLeay moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Scholes), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 NATIONAL WATER RESOURCES (FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE) BILL 1978: Mr Newman (Minister for National Development), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to grant financial assistance to the States in connexion with the development and management of national water resources.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Newman moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Keating), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

13 INDUSTRIES ASSISTANCE COMMISSION AMENDMENT BILL 1978: Mr Fife (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Industries Assistance Commission Act* 1973.

Bill read a first time

Mr Fife moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hurford), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

14 Customs Tariff Amendment Bill 1978: Mr Fife (Minister for Business and Consumer Affairs) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Customs Tariff Act 1966.
Bill read a first time.

Mr Fife moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Hurford), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
