# WEDNESDAY, 10 MAY 1978

- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF FORMER SENATOR (THE HONOURABLE SIR DENHAM HENTY): Mr Fraser (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable Sir Denham Henty, and moved—That this House expresses its deep regret at the death, on 9 May, of the Honourable Sir Denham Henty, K.B.E., a Senator for Tasmania from 1950 to 1968 and a Minister of the Crown from 1956 to 1968; places on record its deep appreciation of his long and meritorious public service and tenders its sympathy to his family in their bereavement.
  - And Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Sinclair (Deputy Leader of the National Country Party of Australia) and other honourable Members having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Question—passed.

- 3 DEATH OF MR ALDO MORO: Mr Fraser (Prime Minister), by leave, referred to the murder by terrorists of Mr Aldo Moro, a former Prime Minister of Italy, and associated the House with expressions of sympathy to the people and Government of Italy and members of Mr Moro's family.
  - Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, supported the remarks of the Prime Minister.
- 4 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Baume, Mr L. K. Johnson and Mr Johnston—from certain citizens praying that item 6469 be removed from the standard medical benefits table.
  - Dr Klugman, Mr Morris and Mr Sainsbury—from certain citizens praying for the establishment of a fund whereby loans can be made to means tested pensioners for the necessary maintenance of their homes.
  - Mr Giles—from certain citizens praying for the protection of Australian grape growers by reducing excise duty on brandy produced in Australia, reducing the quantity of brandy imported and abolishing sales tax on brandy.
  - Mr Jarman—from certain members and ex-members of the citizens forces of Australia praying for the resumption of the award of several distinctive reserve forces decorations and medals for long service and good conduct.
  - Sir William McMahon—from certain citizens praying that the use of retrospectivity in the Income Tax Assessment Amendment Bill 1978 be rejected.
  - Mr Sinclair—from certain citizens praying that public funding of pre-term or abortion clinics be withdrawn and the provisions on abortion in the report of the Royal Commission on Human Relationships be rejected.
  - Mr Wilson—from certain citizens praying for the initiation of a national family policy and the use of the concept of family impact statements as a means of highlighting family needs.

- 11 Message from the Governor-General, Proposed expenditure for service of the Year, 1978–79—Interim provision—Supply Bill (No. 1) 1978–79: Message No. 26, dated 9 May 1978, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced—
  - (a) transmitting to the House of Representatives particulars of proposed additional expenditure from the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending on 30 June 1979, for which interim provision is necessary and recommending an appropriation of the Consolidated Revenue Fund accordingly; and
  - (b) recommending to the House of Representatives an appropriation of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending on 30 June 1979, for the payment of such increases in salaries and wages and payments in the nature of salary, for which provision is made in the attached particulars of proposed expenditure as have become payable or become payable, or have commenced or commence to be paid, during that year in accordance with any law, or in accordance with an award, order or determination made under a law.
