- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Bryant, Dr Jenkins, Mr Jull and Mr E. L. Robinson—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished.
 - Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that residents of Dover and Southport, Tas., be charged the local telephone call rate for calls to Hobart.
 - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain sports men and women and others praying that the participation of a full Australian contingent at the Moscow Olympic Games be ensured.
 - Mr Jull—from certain citizens praying that the imperial system of weights and measures be restored.
 - Mr O'Keefe—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the 1980 level of education expenditure to Government schools be restored and increased in real terms.
 - Mr E. L. Robinson—from certain citizens praying that representations be made to the Government of the U.S.S.R. for the immediate release from prison of Igor Ogurtsov.
 - Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that certain Kampuchean refugees currently being held in refugee camps in Thailand be resettled in Australia.
 - Mr Uren—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be maintained and Federal Government support for its activities be increased.

- 3 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Fraser (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Nixon (Minister for Primary Industry), Mr Adermann (Minister for Veterans' Affairs) would act as Minister for Primary Industry.
- 4 Suspension of standing orders—Afghanistan—Bi-partisan approach: Mr Scholes having given notice of a motion relating to a bi-partisan approach to the invasion of Afghanistan by the Soviet Union—
 - Mr Viner (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Scholes moving forthwith the motion of which he has given notice for the next sitting.

Question-put and passed.

5 AFGHANISTAN—INVASION BY SOVIET UNION—BI-PARTISAN APPROACH: Mr Scholes moved—That this House expresses its concern that the Government has clearly pursued policies designed to make impossible a bi-partisan approach to Australian condemnation of the actions of the U.S.S.R. in invading and imposing its military dictatorship over Afghanistan.

Debate ensued.

Mr Nixon (Minister for Primary Industry) moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" (first occurring) be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "this House deeply regrets that the Opposition has failed to join with the Australian people and the Australian Government in their determination to take resolute and effective action to bring home to the Soviet Government and the Soviet people Australia's abhorrence of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan".

Debate continued.

Closure moved: Mr Fraser (Prime Minister) moved—That the question be now put.

Motion-That the question be now put-withdrawn, by leave.

Ordered—That Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) be granted an extension of time.

Debate continued.

Closure: Mr Anthony (Minister for Trade and Resources) moved—That the question be now put.

Question—That the question be now put—put and passed.

And the question—That the amendment be agreed to—being accordingly put—

(2) application to the laws and practices of the States, and

(3) expanded powers and functions for the Human Rights Commission, including effective means of enforcing its recommendations".
