- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 Petitions: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Aldred, Mr Baillieu, Mr D. M. Cameron, Mr Falconer, Mr Fraser, Mr Howe, Mr L. K. Johnson, Mr McVeigh, Mr Martyr, Mr Nixon and Mr Yates—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished
 - Mr Jacobi and Mr Wilson—from certain citizens praying that tax laws be reformed to allow joint incomes to be equally divided, for taxation purposes, between husband and wife.
 - Mr Scholes and Mr Yates—from certain citizens praying that a humane policy be adopted to assist refugees to enter Australia.
 - Mr Baillieu—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council and its recommendations be supported.
 - Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that residents of Dover and Southport, Tas., be charged the local telephone call rate for calls to Hobart.
 - Mr Hayden—from certain teachers of New South Wales praying that the Income Tax Assessment Act be amended to take into account differential conditions so as to minimize disadvantages to teachers serving in country areas.
 - Mr Martin—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be maintained and Federal Government support for its activities be increased.
 - Sir William McMahon—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the 1980 level of education expenditure to Government schools be restored and increased in real terms.
 - Mr Uren—from certain citizens praying that immediate steps be taken to abandon the mining and use of uranium.

7 EXPENDITURE—STANDING COMMITTEE—REPORT ON PARLIAMENT AND PUBLIC EXPENDITURE—GOVERNMENT RESPONSE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr E. L. 9 COMMONWEALTH PARLIAMENTARY ASSOCIATION—25TH COMMONWEALTH PARLIAMENTARY CONFERENCE—REPORT OF DELEGATION FROM COMMONWEALTH OF AUSTRALIA BRANCH—STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS: Mr Lucock, by leave, presented the following paper:

10 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—INTEREST RATES AND HOUSING: Mr Deputy Speaker informed the House that Mr Uren had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Government's policies to prevent a rise in interest rates and the damaging effect a rise will have on low and middle income earners repaying home loans and on an unstable housing industry".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Uren addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

11 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY: Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 and 2, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.

12 Defence Service Homes Amendment Bill 1979: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Uren who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the Bill be withdrawn and re-drafted to provide for:

- (1) the strengthening of the Defence Service Homes Insurance Scheme as a viable Government agency to cover the homes of beneficiaries;
- (2) adequate funds to reduce the waiting period for applicants, and
- (3) a Government-backed guarantee so that mortgage loans can be acquired at reasonable rates".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole, and agreed to, after debate. Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Martin reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Adermann (Minister for Veterans' Affairs), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

13 Loan (War Service Land Settlement) Bill 1980: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Ouestion—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 230, dated 22 February 1980, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of moneys for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Adermann (Minister for Veterans' Affairs), the Bill was read a third time.

 - (1) specific adoption in judicially enforceable form of the rights specified in the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights along the lines of the Human Rights Bill 1973;
 - (2) application to the laws and practices of the States, and
 - (3) expanded powers and functions for the Human Rights Commission, including effective means of enforcing its recommendations"—

- (a) by adding after the words 'human person' in the second recital the words 'from conception';
- (b) by inserting in paragraph 1. of Article 2 after the word 'jurisdiction' the words 'from conception';
- (c) by adding at the end of paragraph 1. of Article 2 the words ', including mental and physical handicap'; and
- (d) by inserting after the word 'life' (first occurring) in paragraph 1. of Article 6 the words 'from conception' ".
