- 1 The House met, at 10.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PRIVILEGE: Mr Fry rose on a matter of privilege and referred to a matter which he had first raised in the House on 1 April 1980 concerning alleged discrimination and intimidation in his employment in the Public Service of Mr David Berthelsen because of evidence given by him to a sub-committee of the Joint Committee on Foreign Affairs and Defence. Mr Fry presented additional documentary material relating to the matter which he asked Mr Speaker to consider.

Mr Speaker stated that he would consider the papers and report to the House.

- 3 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr Dawkins, Mr Holding, Mr Innes, Mr James, Mr L. R. Johnson, Mr Kerin and Mr Willis—from certain sports men and women and others praying that the participation of a full Australian contingent at the Moscow Olympic Games be ensured.
  - Mr Bourchier, Mr E. C. Cameron, Dr Jenkins, Mr Martyr and Mr Staley—from certain citizens praying that the National Women's Advisory Council be abolished.
  - Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Gillard, Dr Jenkins and Mr Lusher—from certain citizens praying that pensions and benefits be increased and adjusted quarterly and that greater taxation relief be given to pensioners and others on low incomes.
  - Mr D. M. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that steps be taken to reduce the excise duty on Australian rum.
  - Mr Hurford—from certain citizens praying that tax laws be reformed to allow joint incomes to be equally divided, for taxation purposes, between husband and wife.
  - Mr L. R. Johnson—from certain citizens praying that the Human Rights Commission Bill 1979 and the Racial Discrimination Amendment Bill 1979 be redrafted to ensure that the rights of all ethnic groups are enhanced.
  - Mr Johnston—from certain residents of Victoria praying that carcass trade be promoted and that exports of live animals for slaughter be banned.

- 37 INTERNATONAL CIVIL AVIATION POLICY ACHIEVEMENTS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT— PAPER NOTED: Mr Hunt (Minister for Transport), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the Government's international civil aviation policy achievements, and, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General, presented the following paper:

International civil aviation policy achievements-Ministerial statement, 23 April 1980.

Mr Killen (Minister for Defence) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for speech: Mr Hunt, by leave, moved— That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Morris speaking for a period not exceeding 32 minutes.

Question-put and passed.

Debate ensued.

Question-That the House take note of the paper-put and passed.
