## TUESDAY, 25 AUGUST 1981

- 1 The House met at 1.45 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Right Honourable Sir Billy Snedden) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Anthony (Deputy Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence through illness of Mr Fraser (Prime Minister), he was acting as Prime Minister.
- 3 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (THE HONOURABLE R. T. POLLARD): Mr Anthony (Acting Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Honourable R. T. Pollard, and moved—That this House expresses its deep regret at the death, on 24 August 1981, of the Honourable Reginald Thomas Pollard, a Member of this House for the Divisions of Ballaarat, from 1937 to 1949, and Lalor, from 1949 to 1966, and Minister for Commerce and Agriculture from 1946 to 1949, places on record its appreciation of his long and meritorious public service and tenders its profound sympathy to his family in their bereavement.
  - And Mr Hayden (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Speaker and other Members having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Question—passed.
