Page 7, clause 16, sub-clause (1), line 32, after "such time", insert "but not less than 14 days".

- Mrs Darling, Mr Goodluck and Mr Hall—from certain citizens praying that the proposed sales tax on books, magazines and newspapers be withdrawn from the Budget proposals.
- Mr Burr and Mr Cunningham—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to legislate for the establishment of plant variety rights in Australia be rejected.
- Mr MacKenzie and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that all provisions of the Heritage Act and the Environment Protection (Impact of Proposals) Act be fully complied with in respect of national estate areas.
- Dr Blewett—from certain citizens praying that Federal powers under the Constitution be used to over-ride State legislation concerning land rights for Aboriginals and funding of welfare matters be directed through Aboriginal community-based and community-controlled organisations.
- Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that Australia Day be celebrated on 26 January each year and that a public holiday be declared on that day, regardless of which day of the week it falls.
- Mr Braithwaite—From certain residents of north Queensland praying that sufficient expenditure be allocated to raise the standard of the national highway in north Queensland to Department of Transport standards.

 - (1) expresses its concern that the customs duties imposed by this Bill in relation to wheelchairs will maintain the high cost of these necessary aids for the disabled, and
 - (2) calls upon the Government immediately to review its decision in relation to wheelchairs with a view to replacing the tariff arrangements provided in the Bill with a bounty scheme for local producers".
