WEDNESDAY, 11 MAY 1983

- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 **PETITIONS:** The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Adermann, Mr Braithwaite, Mr Cadman, Mr Cowan, Mr Drummond, Mr Lusher, Mr Millar and Mr Newman—from certain citizens praying that the Government refrain from ratifying the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.
 - Mr Carlton and Mr Gorman—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.
 - Mr McLeay and Dr Theophanous—from certain citizens praying that a Royal Commission be established to investigate the health and other problems of Australian Vietnam veterans exposed to toxic chemicals during the Vietnam war.
 - Mr Braithwaite—from certain residents of Mackay, Qld, praying that the Mackay Directory Assistance Centre not be closed.
 - Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the findings of the Major Airport Needs of Sydney Committee be endorsed and proposals for an airport at Scheyville, N.S.W., be rejected.
 - Mr Charles—from certain citizens praying that the commercial exploitation of kangaroo by-products be banned.
 - Mr Coleman—from certain citizens praying for the re-introduction of the universal health scheme and reassessment of funding to the States for health care.
 - Mr Newman—from certain citizens praying that alcoholic wines be taxed to a degree comparable to other alcoholic beverages, no tax be imposed on non-alcoholic wines and imposts on all alcoholic beverages be adjusted annually.
 - Mr Scott—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the Parliament require General Motors-Holden to continue its operations at the Woodville Plant, S.A.

3 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—AUSTRALIA'S DEFENCE CAPABILITY: Mr Speaker informed the House that Mr Sinclair (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The threat to Australia's defence capability through the actions of the Labor Government".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support-

4 CONCILIATION AND ARBITRATION AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr Willis (Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1904*.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Willis moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Macphee), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 5 STATES (TAX SHARING AND HEALTH GRANTS) AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr Keating (Treasurer), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981.*
 - Bill read a first time.

Mr Keating moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Howard—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

6 CUSTOMS AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr J. J. Brown (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry and Commerce) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Customs Act 1901*. Bill read a first time.

Mr J. J. Brown moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Moore), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 CUSTOMS TARIFF (ANTI-DUMPING) AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr J. J. Brown (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry and Commerce) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Customs Tariff (Anti-Dumping) Act 1975.

Bill read a first time.

Mr J. J. Brown moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Moore), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

8 INDUSTRIES ASSISTANCE COMMISSION AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr J. J. Brown (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry and Commerce), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend section 23 of the *Industries Assistance Commission Act 1973.*

Bill read a first time.

Mr J. J. Brown moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Moore), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

9 NATIONAL HEALTH AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Dr Blewett (Minister for Health), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *National Health Act* 1953, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Dr Blewett moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Carlton), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

10 BROADCASTING AND TELEVISION AMENDMENT (ELECTION BLACKOUT) BILL 1983: Mr Duffy (Minister for Communications), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend section 116 of the Broadcasting and Television Act 1942. Bill and a first time.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Duffy moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Lloyd), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

11 CHRISTMAS ISLAND AGREEMENT AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr Uren (Minister for Territories and Local Government), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act relating to the Christmas Island Agreement. Bill read a first time.

- 21 MR DAVID COMBE—ASSOCIATION WITH THE GOVERNMENT—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister), by leave, made a ministerial statement concerning Mr David Combe, his association with Mr Ivanov of the Soviet Embassy and the Government's decision that Ministers not deal with him in his capacity as a consultant lobbyist.
 - Mr Peacock (Leader of the Opposition), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.
- 22 EXPENDITURE—STANDING COMMITTEE: Mr Speaker informed the House of the following nominations of Members to be members of the Standing Committee on Expenditure:
 - Mr Baldwin, Mr R. J. Brown, Mr Free, Mr McLeay, Mr A. A. Morris and Mr Mountford had been nominated by the Government Whip, Mr Goodluck, Mr Tuckey and Mr Wilson had been nominated by the Opposition Whip, Mr I. M. D. - 23 TAXATION (INTEREST ON OVERPAYMENTS) BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 11, dated 4 May 1983, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

- 24 AUSTRALIAN BROADCASTING CORPORATION BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—
 - Debate resumed by Mr Lloyd who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House is of the opinion that the Bill should not be proceeded with until—
 - (1) the legal action against the Australian Broadcasting Commission instituted by the Premier of New South Wales is concluded, and
 - (2) an assurance is given by the Government-
 - (a) that no action will be taken to alter the existing membership of the Commission until the Bill is again before the House at the conclusion of those legal proceedings, and
 - (b) that there will be no Government interference with the independence of the Australian Broadcasting Commission in its programming policy".

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Duffy—Minister for Communications), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

 25 AEJOURNMENT: Mr Duffy (Minister for Communications) moved—That the House do now adjourn.
 Evebate ensued.
 Question—put and passed.
