TUESDAY, 24 MAY 1983

- 1 The House met, at 2.15 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

 - Mr Braithwaite and Mr Cross—from certain residents of Mackay, Qld, praying that the Mackay Directory Assistance Centre not be closed.
 - Mr Dobie and Ms McHugh—from certain citizens praying that funds not be allocated for the development of roads or dams in south-west Tasmania but be provided instead for the preservation of the area.
 - Mr Fife and Ms McHugh—from certain citizens praying that podiatry services be extended to cover all pensioners.

9 WHEAT MARKETING AMENDMENT BILL 1933: Mr Kerin (Minister for Primary Industry), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Wheat Marketing Act 1979.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Kerin moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr McVeigh), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Ordered—That Mr Fife be granted an extension of time.

13 HOUSING POLICY INITIATIVES—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PAPER NOTED: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Young (Leader of the House)—That the House take note of the paper (presented on 19 May 1983), viz.:

Housing policy initiatives—Ministerial statement, 19 May 1983—

Debate resumed by Mr Fife who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House is of the opinion that, whilst the Government's stated aim of further assisting the housing industry is to be supported, the Government should be condemned for taking action contrary to this aim and particularly condemned for its reduction in assistance to current home purchasers by effectively increasing their interest payment burden, and for its overall reduction in housing assistance".

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the House take note of the paper—put and passed.

14 ECONOMIC PLANNING ADVISORY COUNCIL BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Hill, by leave, taken as a whole.

Mr Shipton moved the following amendment: Clause 9, page 5, omit paragraph (f) of sub-clause (1), substitute the following paragraphs:

- "(f) 2 members selected after consultation between the Minister or his representative and such organisations (other than the organisations referred to in paragraph (fa)) that are representative of business as the Minister considers appropriate;
- (fa) 1 member selected after consultation between the Minister or his representative and organisations representative of small business as the Minister considers appropriate:".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed: Mr Mountford reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Young (Special Minister of State), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

15 COMMUNITY EMPLOYMENT BILL 1983. The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Macphee who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House—

- (1) is of the opinion that the Government should acknowledge that permanent jobs will only be created when economic recovery occurs and should do its utmost to implement policies consistent with the following extracts from the National Economic Summit Communique:
 - (a) There is a recognition that to achieve recovery will require restraint in expectations and claims from all sections of the community except the impoverished (paragraph 2);
 - (b) It is a legitimate expectation that income of the employed shall be increased in real terms through time in line with productivity (paragraph 8), and

- (c) The preservation of the private sector as a profitable operating sector is essential to Australia's well-being and to encourage job creating investment both from within Australia and abroad (paragraph 9), and
- (2) resolves that the Government should seek to extend the wages pause and subsequent wage restraint until economic recovery, increased investment and consequent job creation have commenced strongly".

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.
