  - Mr Anthony—from certain citizens praying that the Government refrain from ratifying the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.
  - Mr Burr—from certain citizens praying that the Sex Discrimination Bill be amended to prevent inconsistencies with the principles of justice and equality and that a conscience vote on the Bill be permitted to all Members of Parliament.
  - Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying that the Sex Discrimination Bill be passed.
  - Mrs Darling—from certain residents of Queensland praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.
  - Mr Dobie—from certain citizens praying that the ban on the export of kangaroo products be re-applied.
  - Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that a moratorium on uranium mining and treatment be declared, that certain other action be taken in relation to the mining, processing and export of Australia's uranium and that the Roxby Uranium Mine development be discontinued.
  - Mr Porter—from certain electors of the Division of Barker praying that the proposals in Medicare legislation to allow children privacy in medical matters be withdrawn.
  - Mr. Reeves—from certain residents of the Northern Territory praying that the transcontinental (north-south) railway be commenced and completed at an early date.
