## THURSDAY, 20 OCTOBER 1983

- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF FORMER MEMBER (MR P. W. C. STOKES): Mr Speaker informed the House of the death, on 18 October 1983, of Mr Philip William Clifford Stokes, O.B.E., E.D., a Member of this House for the Division of Maribyrnong from 1955 to 1969.
  - As a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased all Members present stood, in silence.
- 3 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
  - Mr E. C. Cameron, Mr Cowan, Mrs Kelly, Mr Keogh, Mr MacKellar, Mr Millar, Mr Saunderson and Mr Young—from certain citizens praying that chiropractic services be included in Medicare when it is introduced.
  - Mr Chynoweth and Mr MacKellar—from certain citizens praying that the Government refrain from ratifying the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.
  - Mr Brumby—from certain citizens praying that the Government ratify the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women.
  - Mr Gorman—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that legislation be enacted to ban the advertising of alcohol from commercial television and radio.
  - Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that the recommendations of the Committee of Review into the Impact of Radford College, A.C.T., not be implemented and certain other action be taken in respect of education funding.
  - Mr Scott—from certain citizens praying that a moratorium on uranium mining and treatment be declared, that certain other action be taken in relation to the mining, processing and export of Australia's uranium and that the Roxby Uranium Mine development be discontinued.
  - Mr Scott—from certain citizens praying that all foreign bases be removed from Australia.
  - Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that Australia raise in the United Nations a request that the Polish Government honour its obligations under the Helsinki Agreement.

Page 17, clause 30, sub-clauses (2) and (3), lines 30 to 43, leave out the sub-clauses.

On the motion of Dr Blewett (Minister representing the Minister for Social Security) the amendment was agreed to, after debate.

6 AUSTRALIAN SHIPPING COMMISSION AMENDMENT BILL 1983: Mr P. F. Morris (Minister for Transport), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Australian Shipping Commission Act 1956, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr P. F. Morris moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Lusher), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

7 STRATPLAN COMPUTER CENTRE, MELBOURNE—APPROVAL OF WORK: Mr Hurford (Minister for Housing and Construction), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act 1969*, it is expedient to carry out the following proposed work which was referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works and on which the Committee has duly reported to Parliament: Stratplan Computer Centre, Melbourne, Vic.

8 FREEDOM OF INFORMATION AMENDMENT BILL 1983: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

On the motion of Mr Bowen (Minister representing the Attorney-General), by leave, the following amendments were made together:

Amendments—

Clause 27-

Page 14, lines 15 and 16, omit ", not being a decision made under sections 33 and 33A of this Act", substitute "(not being a decision made by a Minister)".

Page 14, at the end of proposed section 52F add the following sub-section:

"(3) Notwithstanding anything in this Part, the reference in sub-section (1) to a decision made by a Minister shall not be taken to include a reference to a decision made by a person in the exercise of a power delegated by a Minister.".

Clause 30, page 15, omit the clause, substitute the following clause:

## **Applications to Administrative Appeals Tribunal**

"30. Section 55 of the Principal Act is amended—

- (a) by omitting from paragraph (3) (b) 'he made that application' and substituting 'that application was received by or on behalf of the agency concerned'; and
- (b) by omitting from paragraph (4) (c) '57 (4)' and substituting '52B (3)'.

New clause—

Page 15, after clause 31 insert the following new clause:

#### Repeal of section 57

"31A. Section 57 of the Principal Act is repealed.".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr Johnson reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Bowen, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
