- 2 NUGAN HAND GROUP—INTERIM REPORT NO. 2 OF ROYAL COMMISSION OF INQUIRY—PUBLICATION OF PAPER—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Young (Special Minister of State) presented the following paper:
 - Nugan Hand group—Interim Report No. 2 of Royal Commission of Inquiry on Commonwealth terms of reference (b), (c) and (d), dated 12 December 1984.
 - Mr Young, by leave, moved—
 - (1) That this House, in accordance with the provisions of the Parliamentary Papers Act 1908, authorises the publication of Interim Report No. 2, dated December 1984, of the Commissioner appointed to inquire into the activities of the Nugan Hand group, and
 - (2) That the report be printed.

And so it was resolved in the affirmative.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Kerin (Minister for Primary Industry), the Bill was read a third time.

23 MARRIAGE AMENDMENT BILL 1985: The order of the day having been read for the second reading---Mr Bowen (Attorney-General) moved---That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate ensued.

Mr Bowen addressing the House-

Adjournment negatived: It being 7.15 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mr Bowen requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate— Question—put and negatived.

Mr Bowen continued his speech. Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time. The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

Mr N. A. Brown moved the following amendment: Clause 15, page 5, omit proposed sub-section (4), substitute the following sub-section:

"'(4) Nothing in this Act shall prevent a person, not being a minister of religion, who is authorized under sub-section (2) to solemnize marriages, from contracting with the parties to an intended marriage for the payment, for the solemnization of that marriage by that person, of a fee that exceeds the fee prescribed by regulations made under section 120 that is applicable to the solemnization of that marriage by that person.'."

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Rocher reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Bowen, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
