## THURSDAY, 10 OCTOBER 1985

1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2 PRIVILEGE—STATEMENT BY MR SPEAKER: Mr Speaker referred to the matter of privilege raised yesterday by Mr N. A. Brown (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) concerning the question of fees being required of Members of Parliament in respect of their requests under the Freedom of Information Act. Mr Speaker stated that the circumstances outlined by the Member did not indicate an obstruction or impediment such as would be held to constitute a contempt, bearing in mind that the Parliament had passed a law on the matter and had not made any special comprehensive exemptions in respect of Members.

- Mr Speaker stated that, on the information available, no prima facie case of breach of privilege had been established.
- 3 TAXATION LAWS AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 2) 1985: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole.

On the motion of Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment), by leave, the following amendments were made together:

Clause 27-

Page 29, line 19, omit "of the present values".

Page 29, line 27, after "values" insert "of the payment portions".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mrs Darling reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Cohen, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

4 INCOME TAX (INDIVIDUALS) BILL 1985: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment), the Bill was read a third time.

5 INCOME TAX (COMPANIES, CORPORATE UNIT TRUSTS AND SUPERANNUATION FUNDS) BILL 1985: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question-That the Bill be now read a second time-Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

- On the motion of Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment), the Bill was read a third time.
- 6 MEDICARE LEVY BILL 1985: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question-That the Bill be now read a second time\_

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment), the Bill was read a third time.

7 REFORM OF THE AUSTRALIAN TAXATION SYSTEM—PAPER—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the motion of Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment)-That the House take note of the paper (presented on 8 October 1985), viz.:

Reform of the Australian taxation system-Ministerial statement by Mr Keating, Treasurer, dated September 1985, together with attachments-

Debate resumed.

Mr Carlton moved, as an amendment-That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "this House, whilst welcoming the promised relief of double taxation of dividends and the promised reductions in marginal taxation rates, believes that the tax package presented by the Treasurer falls well short of the fundamental and lasting reform of our taxation system so frequently promised by the Government, and more specifically-

- (1) condemns the proposed introduction of the new capital gains tax;
- (2) notes that under the Government's proposals the share of revenue carried by personal income tax will continue to rise;
- (3) condemns the arbitrary nature of the attack on fringe benefits and entertainment expenses;
- (4) expresses grave concern over the effects on enterprise, investment and employment due to the additional cost burdens on business arising from the capital gains tax, the higher rate of company tax, the fringe benefits tax and the loss of deductions for legitimate entertaining expenses;
- (5) regrets the package will have an adverse and discriminatory impact upon rural Australia;
- (6) notes the particular discriminatory nature of the attack on the deductibility of farm losses against non-farm income, and
- (7) condemns the proposed foreign tax credit system as likely to discourage investment by Australian companies in our region".

Debate continued.

Mr Reith addressing the House-

- It being 12.45 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with sessional order 106A, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.
- 8 COMMONWEALTH EMPLOYEES (EMPLOYMENT PROVISIONS) BILL 1985: Mr Shack, pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make provision with respect to certain matters concerning Commonwealth employees. Bill read a first time.

Mr Shack moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate, by leave, ensued.

Mr McGauran addressing the House-

It being 1.45 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 109, as amended by sessional order.

Ordered—That the time for the discussion of notice No. 1 be extended until 2 p.m.

Debate continued.

The time allotted for precedence to general business having expired, the debate was interrupted, Mr Punch was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate was made an order of the day for the next sitting.
