5 MOUNT ALLAN LAND CLAIM—REPORT BY ABORIGINAL LAND COMMISSIONER— MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Holding (Minister for Aboriginal Affairs) presented the following paper:

6 GURINDJI LAND CLAIM TO DAGURAGU STATION-REPORT BY ABORIGINAL LAND COMMISSIONER-MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF PAPER: Mr Holding (Minister for Aboriginal Affairs) presented the following paper:

Aboriginal Land Commissioner—Report to the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and the Administrator of the Northern Territory relating to Gurindji Land Claim to Daguragu Station.

Mr Young (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper. Debate adjourned (Mr N. A. Brown—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

 - Mr Burr, Mr Downer and Mr Goodluck—from certain citizens praying that the problems which identification cards are intended to reduce be attacked by other methods.
 - Mr Cadman, Mr Fife and Mr McArthur—from certain citizens praying that the rights of private enterprise be protected and any inequitable additional taxes be rejected.
 - Mr Downer and Mr Wilson—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the principle that pensioner patients pay no more than their pension for nursing home care be restored and that certain other action be taken in relation to nursing home benefits.

8 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—GOVERNMENT'S HIGH INTEREST RATE POLICY: The House was informed that Mr Carlton had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The continuing escalation of costs to home owners, small business and rural industries arising from the Government's high interest rate policy".

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hurford (Minister representing the Minister for Finance), the Bill was read a third time.

10 APPROPRIATION BILL (NO. 1) 1985-86: The House, according to order, resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the further consideration of the Bill.
