- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 DEATH OF PRIME MINISTER OF SWEDEN (MR OLOF PALME): Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) referred to the death of the Prime Minister of Sweden (Mr Olof Palme), and moved—That this House express its profound sadness at the death on 1 March 1986 of Mr Olof Palme, Prime Minister of Sweden, its condemnation of the brutal act which took his life, and its condolences to Mr Palme's family and to the Government and people of Sweden.
 - And Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) having seconded the motion, and Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia) and other Members having addressed the House in support thereof, and all Members present having risen, in silence—

Question-passed.

- 3 COMMONWEALTH DAY: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) referred to the commemoration of Commonwealth Day on 10 March 1986 and the significance of the Commonwealth. Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) also referred to the matter.
- 4 PRIVILEGE—COMPLAINT OF BREACH: Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia) raised, as a matter of privilege, the content of an article in the Sun Weekend of 22 February 1986 which referred to reported actions of the Treasurer in respect of the Chairman of Committees, Mr McLeay.

Mr Sinclair produced a copy of the article.

Mr McLeay addressed himself to the matter raised.

- Madam Speaker stated that she would consider the matter and advise the House in due course.
- 5 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Mr Hayden (Minister for Foreign Affairs), Senator Evans (Minister for Resources and Energy) was acting as Minister for Foreign Affairs and would be represented in this House by Mr Bowen (Attorney-General).
