- 3 COMPANIES AND SECURITIES LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL 1986: Mr Bowen (Attorney-General), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend laws relating to companies and securities.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Bowen moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
