TUESDAY, 18 MARCH 1986

- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PRIVILEGE: Mr Humphreys raised, as a matter of privilege, the alteration of Hansard transcripts by a Member.

Mr Slipper and Mr Tuckey addressed themselves to the matter.

Madam Speaker stated that the matter should not be pursued as a matter of privilege and that she would examine it and advise the House.

3 PRIVILEGE—COMPLAINT OF BREACH: Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia) raised, as a matter of privilege, the use of excerpts of proceedings of the House by the ABC radio program "P.M." and the ATN7 news which included remarks which were later withdrawn.

Mr Sinclair produced transcripts from both programs.

Mr Young (Special Minister of State) addressed himself to the matter.

Madam Speaker stated that she would examine the matter and advise the House of her decision as soon as possible.

- 4 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence abroad of Dr Blewett (Minister for Health), Senator Ryan (Minister for Education) was acting as Minister for Health and would be represented in this House by Mr Dawkins (Minister for Trade).
- 5 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice being asked—

Paper: Mr Beale, in accordance with standing order 321, having called for a document quoted from by Mr West (Minister for Housing and Construction)—

Mr West laid upon the Table the following paper: Vacancy rates—Table for each of the capital cities surveyed by the Real Estate Institute of Australia per quarter from 1981.

7 ABORIGINAL LAND RIGHTS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PAPER NOTED: Mr Holding (Minister for Aboriginal Affairs), by leave, made a ministerial statement concerning Aboriginal land rights and related matters and presented the following paper:

Aboriginal land rights-Ministerial statement, 18 March 1986.

Mr Beazley (Minister for Defence) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Suspension of standing orders—Extended time for speech: Mr Beazley, by leave, moved—That so much of the standing orders be suspended as would prevent Mr Connolly speaking for a period not exceeding 20 minutes.

Question—put and passed.

Debate ensued.

Question—That the House take note of the paper—put and passed.

Mr Cobb, Mr Fife, Mr Hunt, Mr Ruddock and Mr White—from certain citizens praying that the commitment to the oil import parity pricing policy be honoured.

Mr Blunt and Mr Rocher—from certain citizens praying that the existing

national flag remain sacrosanct.

Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher in the same

Mr. Conquest, and Mr. Walston, from contain citizens proving that the

Mr Conquest and Mr Webster—from certain citizens praying that the importation and sale of hard core pornography and grossly obscene publications be prevented and that certain other action be taken in relation to censorship.

Mr N. A. Brown—from certain citizens praying that reference to God be included in the national anthem by 1988.

Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the rights of private enterprise be protected and any inequitable additional taxes be rejected.

Mr Cobb—from certain citizens praying that the closure of the South Dubbo Post Office, NSW, be prevented.

- Mrs Darling—from certain citizens praying for the continuation of the public inquiry into the legislation relating to video classification.
- Mr Free—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the Western Sydney State University be established in conjunction with the NSW Government.
- Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the decision to close the Enterprise Migrant Hostel, Vic., be reversed.
- Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying for official recognition of the African National Congress and the South West Africa Peoples Organisation and that certain other financial and humanitarian support be given to the South African and Namibian people.

Dr Watson—from certain citizens praying that the Flags Amendment Bill receive a speedy passage.

Dr Watson—from certain residents of Queensland praying that no action be taken to change the national flag.

9 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—HOUSING INDUSTRY: The House was informed that Mr Beale had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The distress caused to Australian families by the impact of the Hawke Government's high interest rate and tax policies on the housing industry".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Beale addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

10 FOREIGN TAKEOVERS AMENDMENT BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Smallwares for the new Parliament House—Statement by Madam Speaker: Madam Speaker referred to articles in the Press about the provision of smallwares for the new Parliament House and informed the House of recent decisions on this matter by the Joint Standing Committee on the New Parliament House.

Mrs Sullivan and Mr McLeay, by leave, also made statements in connection with the matter.

Privilege—Statements by Madam Speaker: Madam Speaker referred to the matters of privilege raised earlier this day by Mr Humphreys and Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia) (see entries Nos. 2 and 3, respectively). In regard to the first matter, relating to the alteration of Hansard transcripts by a Member, Madam Speaker repeated that no question of privilege was involved.

Mr Slipper addressed himself to the matter.

In relation to the second matter, concerning the use of an excerpt of proceedings of the House in radio and television reports, Madam Speaker stated that this was a matter for consideration by the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of Parliamentary Proceedings and that she had arranged for this to occur. Madam Speaker further stated that she was not prepared to accord precedence to a motion on the matter.

Debate continued.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Hurford (Minister Assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

11 AIR NAVIGATION AMENDMENT BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Debate adjourned (Mr Smith), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS: Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia), by indulgence of the Chair, referred to the statement made earlier this day by Madam Speaker on the matter of privilege he had raised (see entry No. 10).

Mr Young (Leader of the House), by indulgence of the Chair, addressing the House—

Adjournment negatived: It being 10.15 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mr Young requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate— Question—put and negatived.

Mr Young concluded his speech.

13 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Young (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Debate extended: It being 11 p.m., the debate was interrupted.

Mr Cohen (Minister for Arts, Heritage and Environment) required the debate to be extended.

The debate continuing until 11.01 p.m., Mr Deputy Speaker adjourned the House until tomorrow at 10 a.m.
