- 8 LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE—NATIONAL INQUIRY—GOVERNMENT RESPONSE—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Uren (Minister for Local Government and Administrative Services), by leave, made a ministerial statement informing the House of the Government's response to the National Inquiry into Local Government Finance.
 - Mr Moore, by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.

 - Mr Cowan, Dr H. R. Edwards, Mr McLeay and Mr O'Neil—from certain citizens praying that the standard pension be raised to 25% of average weekly earnings and certain other action be taken to assist pensioners and low income earners.
 - Mr Bilney, Mr O'Neil and Mr Young—from certain residents of South Australia praying for a delay in the new funding arrangements for subsidised child care centres planned for April 1986 and that certain other action be taken in relation to children's services.
 - Mr Free, Mr Grace and Mr Price—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the Western Sydney State University be established in conjunction with the NSW Government.
 - Mr Grace, Mr Price and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that the Government of Sri Lanka be persuaded to pursue a political solution to allow the Tamils to live in peace and dignity and certain other action be taken to aid the Tamils.
