Mr Blunt and Mr Hawker-from certain residents of the Divisions of Richmond and Wannon, respectively, praying that the proposal for an identification card be rejected.

Mr I. M. D. Cameron and Mr McGauran-from certain citizens praying that the fringe benefits tax legislation be repealed.

Mr Cadman—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Mr Hawker and Mr Reith—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.

Mr Kent and Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that the United States Government be urged to join the Soviet Union's nuclear test ban.

Mr Beale—from certain citizens praying that the fringe benefits tax and other taxes and administrative burdens on small businesses be repealed.

Mr Cadman—from certain citizens praying that the right of employees to select their own superannuation scheme be guaranteed and certain other action be taken in relation to superannuation.

Mr Cadman—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that the Western Sydney State University be established in conjunction with the NSW Government.

Mr D. M. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that an occupational category for housewives be included in the Census and that the "Fair go for Women" survey be recognised as a costly exercise of dubious value.

Mr I. M. D. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that a bill providing for a national system for therapeutic goods for human use not be introduced and that therapeutic goods continue to be freely available through present outlets.

Dr H. R. Edwards—from certain citizens praying that incentive and opportunity be restored to the Australian economy and certain restrictions on small business be abandoned.

Mr Hawker—from certain citizens praying that the assets test, capital gains tax, fringe benefits tax and tax on lump sum superannuation be repealed.

Mr Hawker—from certain citizens praying that the price of petrol be reduced by 3 cents per litre and that certain other action be taken in relation to petrol pricing.

Mr Hawker—from certain citizens praying that family allowance payments be increased and proposed changes to the spouse rebate be rejected.

Mr Hawker—from certain citizens praying that the assets test on pensions be repealed.

BILL 1987: Message No. 406, dated 19 February 1987, from the Senate was reported transmitting for the concurrence of the House a Bill for "An Act to make provision in relation to the non-proliferation of nuclear weapons and to establish, in accordance with certain international treaties and agreements to which Australia is a party, a system for the imposition and maintenance of nuclear safeguards in Australia, and for related matters".
