- 6 MINISTER FOR TRADE NEGOTIATIONS—VISIT TO NORTH AND SOUTH AMERICA—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT: Mr Duffy (Minister for Trade Negotiations), by leave, made a ministerial statement concerning his recent visit to Canada, the United States of America, Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay.
 - Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia), by leave, also made a statement with reference to the matter.

Bill read a first time.

Bill read a first time.

Mr J. J. Brown moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connolly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connolly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

19 COMMONWEALTH BORROWING LEVY COLLECTION BILL 1987: Mr Holding (Minister Assisting the Treasurer) presented a Bill for an Act to provide for the collection of levy imposed by the Commonwealth Borrowing Levy Act 1987, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Holding moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper: Mr Holding presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connolly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

20 CUSTOMS TARIFF AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 2) 1987: Mr Jones (Minister for Science and Small Business) presented a Bill for an Act to amend the Customs Tariff Act 1987.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Jones moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.
