4 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—ACCESS TO EVIDENCE AND RECORDS OF JOINT COMMITTEES ON THE AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY: The following message from the Senate was reported:

Message No. 20

Madam Speaker,

The Senate acquaints the House of Representatives of the following Resolution agreed to by the Senate this day:

(1) That the following matters be referred to the Standing Committee on Infrastructure:

All notices of intention to modify or vary the plan of lay-out of the city of Canberra and its environs, and all modifications and variations of that plan, under section 12A of the Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910.

- (2) That the Committee report to the Senate on each notice, modification and variation.
- (3) That, for the purpose of considering the matters referred to in paragraph (1), the Committee have power to consider and make use of the evidence and records of the Joint Committees on the Australian Capital Territory appointed during previous Parliaments.

The Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives in paragraph (3) of this Resolution.

14 DEFENCE HOUSING AUTHORITY BILL 1987: The order of the day having been read for the second reading—Mrs Kelly (Minister for Defence Science and Personnel) moved—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Paper: Mrs Kelly presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Mr White moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the provisions of the Bill, this House:

- (1) recognises that the housing needs of service men and women are one of the most important factors in their conditions of service; and
- (2) regrets the failure of the Government to assist in any adequate and practical way Australian Defence Force personnel to purchase privately built homes". Debate continued.

Mrs Kelly addressing the House-

Adjournment negatived: It being 10.15 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mrs Kelly requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate— Question—put and negatived.

Mrs Kelly continued her speech.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put and passed.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mrs Kelly, the Bill was read a third time.

15 ADJOURNMENT: Mrs Kelly (Minister for Defence Science and Personnel) moved— That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
