18 PETROLEUM EXCISE (PRICES) BILL 1987: Mr P. F. Morris (Minister for Resources) presented a Bill for an Act to establish prices in relation to which Duties of Excise are to be imposed on certain crude petroleum oil, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr P. F. Morris moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper: Mr P. F. Morris presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connolly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

19 WILLIAMSTOWN DOCKYARD EMPLOYEES BILL 1987: Mrs Kelly (Minister for Defence Science and Personnel), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to make provision for certain employees of Williamstown Dockyard. Bill read a first time.

Mrs Kelly moved-That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper: Mrs Kelly presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr Connolly), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

On the motion of Mr Howe (Minister for Social Security), by leave, the following amendments were made together, after debate:

Clause 41, page 36, lines 4 and 5, omit the definition of "parent", substitute the following definition:

"'parent', in relation to a person (in this definition called the 'child'), means another person who is:

- (a) a natural or adoptive parent of the child;
- (b) acting as the child's guardian on a long term basis; or
- (c) the spouse of such a parent or guardian;

but does not include another person:

- (d) with whom the child does not live if the child is living with a different person to whom paragraph (a), (b) or (c) applies; or
- (e) who the Secretary decides, in the special circumstances of the case, should not be treated as a parent of the child;".

Clause 109, page 67, lines 22-24, omit the note in italics at the foot of subclause (2), substitute the following note: "Commencement: Immediately after the commencement of the provisions of the Veterans' Entitlements (Transitional Provisions and Consequential Amendments) Act 1986 (other than section 61 of that Act)".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr Mildren reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Howe, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
