- 3 SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS—MOTION OF CENSURE OF THE MINISTER FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND TRADE: Mr Spender having delivered to the Clerk a notice of motion of censure of the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade which he proposed to move at the next sitting and the notice having been reported to the House—
 - Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent the honourable Member for North Sydney moving forthwith the motion of censure of the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade of which he has given notice for the next sitting.

Question-put and passed.

- 4 MINISTER FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND TRADE—MOTION OF CENSURE: Mr Spender moved—That this House censures the Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade for the following reasons—
 - (1) his gross abuse in the recent defence debate of the privileges of this House of absolute freedom of speech;
 - (2) he has demeaned his position as Minister and misused his powers by gaining access to a confidential personal file of a former officer of his Department for the purposes of a premeditated parliamentary attack on him; and
 - (3) by these actions he has gravely compromised the system of confidential personal assessments which are crucial to the operations of his and other Departments and has attacked the right of Australians to basic protections of privacy.

Debate ensued.

- 11 POSTPONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY: Ordered—That orders of the day Nos. 1 to 4, government business, be postponed until a later hour this day.
- 12 TRANSPORT, COMMUNICATIONS AND INFRASTRUCTURE—STANDING COMMITTEES—REFERENCE AND PROPOSED JOINT COMMITTEE POWERS AND PROCEEDINGS—SENATE'S RESOLUTION: The order of the day having been read for the consideration of message No. 131 from the Senate transmitting a resolution agreed to by the Senate relating to the Standing Committees on Transport, Communication and Infrastructure of the Senate and the House of Representatives when sitting as a joint committee—

Mr Punch (Minister for the Arts and Territories) moved—

- (1) That all aspects of the Australian Capital Territory leasehold system be referred to the Standing Committee on Transport, Communications and Infrastructure for inquiry and report.
- (2) That the committee when inquiring into this matter:
 - (a) confer with a similar committee of the Senate; and
 - (b) have power to consider and make use of the evidence and records of the Joint Committees on the Australian Capital Territory appointed during previous Parliaments and the paper entitled *The Canberra Leasehold System* prepared by Professor Max Neutze for the Joint Committee on the Australian Capital Territory appointed in the 34th Parliament.
- (3) That this House concurs in paragraph (2) of the resolution transmitted in message No. 131 of the Senate relating to the powers and proceedings of the Standing Committees on Transport, Communications and Infrastructure of the Senate and House of Representatives when sitting as a joint committee.

- (4) That the provisions of the resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the standing orders, have effect notwithstanding anything contained in the standing orders.
- (5) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution and seeking its concurrence in subparagraph (2) (b) of this resolution.

Question—put and passed.

- 13 APPROPRIATION BILL (NO. 3) 1987-88: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Peacock (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House notes that:
 - (1) Budget estimates put Commonwealth Government outlays at over a quarter of Australia's GDP, and that this is funded by revenue collection that has made this the highest taxing Government in the post-war history of Australia:
 - (2) the Government has increasingly burdened not only individuals but business with new incentive-sapping taxes like the fringe benefits tax and capital gains tax;
 - (3) national productivity is not expected to rise much more than a dismal 0.5% during the course of 1987-88; and
 - (4) without the incentive to invest and work productively, Australia will find it increasingly difficult to extricate itself from its \$87 billion foreign debt strait jacket without further reductions in our standard of living"—

Debate resumed.
