- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 OUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 3 PAPER: The following paper was presented:
 Industry Research and Development Act—Industry Research and Development
 Board—Report for 1987-88.
- 4 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—SYDNEY (KINGSFORD-SMITH) AIRPORT: The House was informed that Mr Blunt had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The confused and inadequate response of the Government to the crisis facing aviation at Sydney's Kingsford-Smith Airport".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Blunt addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

- 5 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS—JOINT COMMITTEE—RESCISSION OF REFERENCE: Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—
 - (1) That, in accordance with the terms of the resolution of the House of Representatives of 8 May 1985 and of the Senate of 10 May 1985, the reference of the acquisition of automatic data processing facilities by any Commonwealth Department or authority to the Joint Committee of Public Accounts be rescinded; and
 - (2) That a message be sent to the Senate acquainting it of this resolution. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

- 6 MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE: Messages from the Senate, dated 6 March 1989, were reported:
 - (a) returning the States Grants (Technical and Further Education Assistance) Bill 1988 and acquainting the House that the Senate does not insist on its amendments Nos. 2 and 3 to which the House insisted upon disagreeing— Message No. 311.
 - (b) returning the Administrative Services Legislation Amendment Bill 1989 without amendment—Message No. 312.

7 MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE—INTERNATIONAL BANK FOR RECONSTRUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT (GENERAL CAPITAL INCREASE) BILL 1988: The following message from the Senate was reported:

Message No. 310

Madam Speaker,

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act relating to the purchase of further shares of the capital stock of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development", and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to the Bill with the Amendments indicated by the annexed Schedule, in which Amendments the Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives.

SCHEDULE OF THE AMENDMENTS MADE BY THE SENATE

No. 1—Page 1, clause 3, before definition of "Bank", insert the following new definitions:

"'affiliates' means the Association and the Corporation;

'Association' means the International Development Association established under the Articles of Agreement set out in the Schedule to the International Development Association Act 1960;".

No. 2—Page 1, clause 3, after definition of "Bank", insert the following new definition:

"'Corporation' means the International Finance Corporation established under the Articles of Agreement referred to in section 3 of the *International* Finance Corporation Act 1955.".

No. 3-Page 2, after clause 6, add the following new clause:

Annual Report

- "7. (1) As soon as practicable after the end of each financial year the Treasurer shall prepare and cause to be laid before each House of the Parliament a report on the operations of this Act during that financial year.
 - "(2) Without limiting the generality of subsection (1), the report shall include:
 - (a) a statement of the terms and conditions of any agreement or agreements made by the Treasurer with the Bank for the purchase by Australia of any additional shares under this Act;
 - (b) a statement describing the nature and extent of Australia's participation as a member of the Bank and the affiliates during that year;
 - (c) an assessment of the managerial efficiency, and financial and economic effectiveness, of the Bank in carrying out its purposes as provided for in Article 1 of the Articles of Agreement set out in Schedule 2 to the International Monetary Agreements Act 1947;
 - (d) an assessment of the managerial efficiency, and financial and economic effectiveness, of the Association in carrying out its purposes as provided for in Article 1 of the Articles of Agreement set out in the Schedule of the International Development Association Act 1960; and
 - (e) an assessment of the managerial efficiency, and financial and economic effectiveness, of the Corporation in carrying out its purpose as provided for in Schedule 1 of the Articles of Agreement set out in the first Schedule of the *International Finance Corporation Act 1955.*".

On the motion of Mr Humphreys (Minister for Veterans' Affairs), the amendments were agreed to, after debate.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed, Mr McLeay reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Holding (Minister for the Arts and Territories), the House adopted the report.

- 8 AGED OR DISABLED PERSONS HOMES AMENDMENT BILL 1988: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—
 That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Braithwaite, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House:
 - (1) notes the concerns of service-providers in adhering to the changed arrangements, at the lack of funding, and at the lack of flexibility in the arrangements which are diminishing the quality of care to our aged; and
 - (2) expresses its concern at the diminishing morale of the providers of services to the aged because of various Government initiatives, particularly the commissioning of the report I'm Still an Individual"—

Debate resumed.

Ordered—That Mr Staples (Minister for Housing and Aged Care) be granted an extension of time.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 177, dated 1 December 1988, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole.

Proposed new clause-

Mr Braithwaite moved—That the following new clause be inserted in the Bill: "20A. Before section 10FB of the Principal Act, the following section is inserted:

Provisions not to apply in certain circumstances

'10FAB. Nothing in section 10F or 10FA of this Act or in the General Conditions formulated by the Minister under section 10F of this Act shall require an organisation which has not received a subsidy towards the capital cost of an approved hostel to enter into an agreement to admit, or to admit, any person who would be defined as a financially disadvantaged person.'".

Debate continued.

Question—put.

 That the Bill be now read a second time—
 - Debate resumed by Mr Lloyd (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House condemns the Government:

(1) for breaking its commitment to recover not more than 50% of the cost of export inspection charges for agricultural commodities; and

(2) for its obvious policy to move to 100% recovery of the cost of export inspection charges for agricultural commodities, as evidenced by the dramatic increase in the maximum permissible levels of this Bill".
