"Subsections 148C (3) and 148D (1), (3), (4), (5) and (6):

Omit 'Minister' (wherever occurring), substitute 'Authority'.".

Page 35, amendments of section 267C and subsection 267D (5), omit the amendments, substitute:

"Section 267C:

- (a) Omit 'Minister' (wherever occurring), substitute 'Authority'.
- (b) Omit 'he', substitute 'it'.

"Subsection 267D (5):

- (a) Omit 'Minister' (wherever occurring), substitute 'Authority'.
- (b) Omit 'he', substitute 'it'.
- (c) Omit 'under his hand'.".

Page 37, amendments of subsection 283F(1), omit the amendments, substitute:

"Subsection 283F (1):

Omit 'Minister', substitute 'Authority'.

"Subsection 283F (2):

Omit 'in pursuance of those regulations', substitute 'under subsection 425 (1AA)'.".

Page 39, amendment of paragraphs 425 (1) (f) to (fe) (inclusive), omit the amendment, substitute:

"Paragraphs 425 (1) (f) to (ff) (inclusive):

Omit the paragraphs.".

Page 40, after the amendment of section 426, insert:

"Section 426A:

Omit 'the regulations', substitute 'subsection 425 (1AA)'.".

Schedule, as amended, agreed to.

Title agreed to.

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments.

The House resumed; Mr Hollis reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr R. J. Brown, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

19 DRIED FRUITS LEVY AMENDMENT BILL 1990: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Ouestion—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Crean (Minister Assisting the Treasurer), the Bill was read a third time.

20 COMMONWEALTH SERUM LABORATORIES (CONVERSION INTO PUBLIC COMPANY) BILL 1990: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Smith who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the passage of this limited Bill, the House is of the opinion that:

(1) CSL should be fully privatised immediately; and

(2) there should be a full and complete divestment of all the Commonwealth interest and control in CSL as is proposed by this Bill".

Debate continued.

Mr MacKellar was granted leave to continue his remarks when the debate is resumed.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

21 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Howe (Minister for Community Services and Health) moved—That the House do now adjourn.
