7 PROPOSED DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE NOT SUPPORTED—GOVERNMENT'S ONE NATION STATEMENT: The House was informed that Mr Reith (Deputy Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Government's One Nation statement to provide a solution for Australia's dire economic problems as evidenced by Senator Peter Walsh's condemnation of the statement".

The proposed discussion not having received the necessary support (the proposer not being present) the matter was not proceeded with.
