 - The Acting Speaker referred to the Speaker's statement of 17 September 1990 which set out the manner in which complaints of premature disclosure of committee material should be handled and stated that the committee would need to give further consideration to the issue and inform the House of the result of those considerations so that any appropriate action could be taken.
