- 1 The House met, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Leo McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 PETITIONS AND MINISTER'S RESPONSE: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr J. N. Andrew, Mr Charles, Mr Connolly, Mr Ford, Mr Hawker, Mr Jull, Mr Reid and Mr Reith, from 499, 302, 85, 20, 28, 209, 32 and 101 petitioners, respectively, praying that no action be taken to change the national flag unless approved by the people of Australia in a national poll.
 - Mr Fitzgibbon, Mr Lavarch and Mr Smith, from 14, 21 and 23 petitioners, respectively, praying that no change be made to the design or colour of the Australian national flag and that it continue to represent a true manifestation of the nation's history.
 - Mr Hicks and Dr Kemp, from 91 and 19 concerned parents and consumers, respectively, praying that certain action be taken to ensure that legislation controlling television protects the young and impressionable.
 - Mr Lavarch and Mr B. C. Scott, from 10 and 77 residents of Queensland, respectively, praying that any proposal to change the Australian flag be rejected.
 - Mr Beale, from 170 petitioners, praying that the health service not be nationalised without approval by referendum.
 - Mr Cowan, from 296 petitioners, praying for a referendum before any change is made to the design of the existing Australian flag.
 - Mr P. S. Fisher, from 15 petitioners, praying that no action be taken to change the national flag unless approved by the people of Australia in a national referendum.
 - Mr Fitzgibbon, from 53 petitioners, praying that the current Australian flag be retained as our national emblem.
 - Mrs Gallus, from 8578 residents of South Australia, praying that an appropriate level of funding be allocated to meet the needs of residents of nursing homes in South Australia.
 - Dr Kemp, from 55 petitioners, praying that no action be taken to change the national flag.
 - Mr McLachlan, from 198 electors of the Division of Barker, praying that the House inquire into the unjust treatment of the unemployed and disadvantaged in country areas resulting from doctors not bulk-billing for medical attention.
 - Mr McLachlan, from 24 electors of the Division of Barker, praying that the House urge Commonwealth fisheries to bring about an immediate and complete ban on monofilament shark gill nets.

Mr Nehl, from 116 petitioners, praying that the current national flag be preserved and no change be made to its design unless supported by referendum by the majority of Australians in the majority of States.

Mr Reid, from 34 petitioners, praying that the national flag not be

changed except by a referendum.

Mr Scholes, from 17 residents of Victoria, praying that Medicare funding of abortion be terminated by support for the Abortion Funding Abolition Bill 1990.

Mr Sharp, from 243 petitioners, praying that mammogram expenses be covered by Medicare.

Mr Snowdon, from 879 petitioners, praying that the Rocky Ridge Nursing Home, Katherine, NT, remain operational.

Mr Webster, from 809 petitioners, praying that funding of abortions through Medicare cease and certain other action be taken to protect the right to life of the unborn.

Mr Webster, from 458 petitioners, praying that Government funding of abortion be abolished.

 - (2) urges government bodies responsible for sewage disposal methods to consider alternative waste treatment irrigation schemes that would recycle and utilise treated sewage effluent productively in an environmentally responsible manner; and
 - (3) recognises the irrigation sewage treatment scheme proposed as an alternative to the Beenyup Wastewater Treatment Plant (BWTP) north of Perth, which would result in less pollution of our marine environment than the operation of the BWTP, and while subject to stringent environmental standards, would provide economic benefits through the sale of timber and employment of labour.
