The following amendment proposed by Mr. W. Elliot Johnson was then submitted for the decision of the House:—That the following words be inserted after the word "That", viz. :--

"in the opinion of this House the Progressive Land Value Taxation proposals of the present Government are unjust in their incidence, and while supporting the principle of land value taxation as a means of raising necessary public revenue, this House is further of opinion that such taxation should bear evenly upon land-owners in proportion to the value of their land, and should be accompanied by a reduction in taxation on food, clothing, and other household necessities, tools of trade, and implements of husbandry."

Question—That the words proposed to be inserted be so inserted—put and negatived. Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed.—Bill read a second time. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the Houss resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives. that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize a temporary advance from the Trust Fund to the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

7. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL — NAVAL APPROPRIATION BILL. — The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker : —

DUDLEY, Governor-General.

Message No. 26.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the-Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund the sum of Two million five hundred and ninety thousand pounds for Naval Defence.
