7. Message from the Governor-General.—Shale Oils Bounties Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

Governor-General.

Message No. 34.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for the Payment of Bounties on the Manufacture of Kerosene and Paraffin Wax from Australian Shale.

Melbourne, 3rd November, 1910.

Ordered, by leave—That the foregoing Message be considered forthwith in Committee of the whole House.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
