- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.-Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. WAYS AND MEANS [TARIFF ANOMALIES].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

#### (In the Committee.)

Debate resumed on the motion of Mr. Tudor (see page 228 ante) that certain amendments be made in Schedule A to the Customs Tariff 1908.

After further debate, the motion referred to was agreed to with the following amendments :---

Item 107, omit "material" and insert "materials".

Item 206, after "Gimp," insert "solid-headed". Item 356, lines 4 and 5 (on page 7), omit "brown, cap, casing, sealing, nature or ochre brown, sulphite, sugar," and insert "browns, caps, casings, sealings, nature or ochre browns, sulphites, sugars,".

Resolution to be reported and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed ; Mr. W. Elliot Johnson reported accordingly.

Resolved-That the House will, to-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

And the said Resolution was, on the motion of Mr. Tudor, read, and adopted by the House. Ordered-That Mr. Tudor and Mr. Hughes do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a first time. Mr. Tudor moved, by leave, That the Bill be now read a second time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole. (In the Committee.) Clauses 1 to 4 agreed to. Schedule read. On the motion of Mr. Tudor, the following amendment was made :--Item 206. After the word "solid-headed" omit the comma. Schedule, as amended, agreed to. Title agreed to. Bill to be reported with an amendment. The House resumed; Mr. W. Elliot Johnson reported accordingly. Mr. Tudor moved, pursuant to contingent notice given by Mr. Hughes, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay. Question—put and passed. On the motion of Mr. Tudor, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time. 13. CUSTOMS BILL (1910).-The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time-Debate resumed. Mr. Cook moved, That the debate be now adjourned. Question-That the debate be now adjourned-put and passed. Ordered-That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow. 14. ADJOURNMENT.-Mr. Hughes moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued. Question-put and passed.
