## WEDNESDAY, 6TH DECEMBER, 1911.

- 1. The House met, at half-past ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Commonwealth Inscribed Stock Bill.—The Order of the Day having been read for the consideration in Committee of the whole House of His Excellency the Governor-General's Message No. 17—Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

## (In the Committee.)

Resolved, on the motion of Mr. Fisher, after debate That it is expedient that an appropriation of revenue and moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to provide for Commonwealth Government Inscribed Stock and for other purposes in connexion therewith.

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Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Poynton reported accordingly.

Ordered—That the Report be considered at once.

And the said Resolution was adopted by the House.

Ordered—That Mr. Fisher and Mr. Hughes do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Fisher then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered-That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.

3. Arbitration (Public Service) Bill.—The Order of the Day having been read for the third reading
—Mr. Fisher moved, That the Bill be now read a third time.

Debate ensued.

Mr. Kelly moved an amendment, That the word "now" be omitted from the question.

Debate continued.

Question—That the word proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put and passed.

Debate on main question continued.

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Question—That the Bill be now read a third time—put. The House divided—

MR. SPEAKER,

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act relating to Lighthouses, Lightships, Beacons, and Buoys," and acquaints the House that the Senate has agreed to Amendments Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 7, 8, and 9, made by the House of Representatives

The Senate has agreed to amendments Nos. 5 and 6, with the amendments indicated in the annexed Schedule, and desires the concurrence of the House of Representatives in such amendments.

The Committee proceeded to consider the Amendments, which are as follow:—

SCHEDULE OF THE AMENDMENTS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES TO WHICH THE SENATE HAS AGREED WITH AMENDMENTS.

No. 5.—Page 2, after clause 8 insert the following new clauses:-

"8a.—(1.) Every harbor authority or other local authority having control of any harbor lights or the lighting or marking of any navigable waters shall, as prescribed, make returns to the Minister in relation to the following matters:—

- (a) the description and situation of each light under its control, and
- (b) the description and situation of each marine mark under its control."

"SB. An action or other proceeding shall not be maintainable against the Protection Commonwealth, or the Minister, or any officer of the Commonwealth by reason of any act, default, error, or omission, whether negligent or otherwise, in relation to any lighthouse or marine mark."

Amendment agreed to with the following amendment, viz. :-

Clause SB, line 1, after "other" insert "civil".

No. 6.—Page 3, clause 9, omit the clause and insert the following new clause:—

"9.—(1.) Light dues in accordance with the prescribed rates or scales, shall Light dues. be levied, and shall be payable with respect to the voyages made by ships or vessels or by way of periodical payment as the regulations prescribe.

"(2.) The regulations may prescribe the rates or scales of light dues to be payable by ships or vessels and all matters necessary or convenient to be prescribed to carry this section

into effect.

"(3.) When rates or scales of light dues have been prescribed under this Act, light dues

prescribed by or under any State Act shall cease to have any effect;

"Provided that nothing in this sub-section shall release any ship or vessel or any person from any liability in respect of any light dues prescribed by or under any State Act which became due before the rates or scales of light dues under this Act came into force."

Amendment agreed to with the following amendment, viz. :-

Sub-clause (3.), line 2, after "Act" (second occurring) insert "(other than dues solely in respect of lights maintained by the State)".

Amendments made by the Senate on amendments Nos. 5 and 6 of the House of Representatives agreed to.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr. Poynton reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Tudor, the House adopted the Report.

9. Message from the Senate.—Seamen's Compensation Bill (1911).—Mr. Speaker announced the receipt of the following Message from the Senate:-

The Senate returns to the House of Representatives the Bill for "An Act relating to compensation to Seamen for injuries suffered in the course of their employment," to which it has agreed with the amendments indicated in the annexed Schedule, in which amendments the Senate requests the concurrence of the House of Representatives.

No. 1.—Page 3, clause 5, line 23, after "Dominions" insert "or of any foreign country".

No. 2.—Page 3, clause 5, at end of clause add the following new sub-clause:-

"(4.) Any undertaking given in pursuance of paragraph (e) of sub-section (2.) of this section shall have effect as a contract between the claimant and the person from whom the compensation is claimed."

No. 3.—Page 5, clause 8, lines 25 and 26, leave out "not exceeding in any individual case one hundred pounds".

No. 4.—Page 11, First Schedule, paragraph (19.), line 6, leave out "is", insert "are".

Amendments Nos. 1 and 2 agreed to.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Poynton reported accordingly. Resolved-That the House will, to-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.
