#### 6 INSPECTOR OF TRANSPORT SECURITY BILL 2006

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Bevis, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) notes the failure of the Howard Government to appoint a person as Inspector of Transport Security until one year after the announcement of the position;
- (2) notes that the Howard Government finally committed to underpin this important job with appropriate laws in May of 2005 but has only now introduced legislation into the House for that purpose;
- (3) condemns the slowness with which the Howard Government dealt with the important role of Inspector of Transport Security;
- (4) condemns the Howard Government's dismissive use of the Inspector of Transport Security who has been engaged on an average of just one day a week in spite of repeated failures in security in the Australian transport sector at the same time as terrorists have targeted aviation and rail transport over years; and
- (5) condemns the Howard Government for its failure to engage the Inspector of the Transport Security in a full time capacity"—

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the bill be now read a second time—put and passed—bill read a second time.

## 8 FINANCIAL TRANSACTION REPORTS AMENDMENT BILL 2006

The order of the day having been read for the second reading—

Mr Ruddock (Attorney-General) presented a revised explanatory memorandum to the bill.

Mr Ruddock moved—That the bill be now read a second time.

Mr Bevis moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "while not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) notes the failure of the Howard Government to draft the Anti-terrorism Bill (No. 2) 2005 correctly;
- (2) notes that the Howard Government initially attempted to give the Anti-Terrorism Bill (No.2) 2005 a one-day Senate inquiry, and that the Government finally allowed only a shortened inquiry;
- (3) notes that this bill and its consumption of parliamentary sitting time could have been completely avoided if the Executive would:
  - (a) draft its legislation properly;
  - (b) allow the Senate adequate time for scrutiny of the legislation; and

- (c) consult meaningfully with stakeholders before rushing unworkable and error-riddled legislation through the Senate;
- (4) notes that the Parliament was recalled in late 2005 at great expense to fix improperly drafted antiterror legislation by changing one word;
- (5) criticises the Government for putting Australia's national security at risk through its shoddy drafting and sloppy approach to legislation;
- (6) notes the extended delay in bringing forward the anti-money laundering regime due to botched consultation with affected industries; and
- (7) notes the Howard Government's failure to meet the FATF mutual evaluation on anti-money laundering and counter-terrorism financing, scoring just nine out of 40 on anti-money laundering, and zero out of nine on counter-terrorism financing".

Debate continued.

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr A. S. Burke, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) opposes the increase in residence requirement to 4 years;
- (2) notes that the Government consulted with the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) on increasing the period from 2 to 3 years on national security grounds but undertook no consultation on the increase to 4 years and has given no adequate reason for this measure;
- (3) opposes the discriminatory treatment of people who lost their Australian citizenship under section 17 of the old Act (acquisition of citizenship of another country) and those who lost citizenship under section 18 (renouncing of citizenship) given that it fails to provide equitable treatment for a number of groups, but particularly the Maltese community; and
- (4) notes that a stateless person would be denied citizenship if convicted for an offence of greater than 5 years even if it were a trumped up conviction under a brutal and oppressive foreign regime"—
