11 PUBLIC WORKS—PARLIAMENTARY STANDING COMMITTEE—REFERENCE OF WORK—PROPOSED AUSTRALIAN SKA PATHFINDER RADIO TELESCOPE IN GERALDTON-GREENOUGH AND IN MURCHISON SHIRE, WA

Dr Kelly (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Defence), pursuant to notice, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Public Works Committee Act 1969*, the following proposed work be referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works for consideration and report: Proposed Australian SKA Pathfinder radio telescope in Geraldton-Greenough and in Murchison Shire, WA.

Question—put and passed.

12 TAX LAWS AMENDMENT (ELECTION COMMITMENTS NO. 1) BILL 2008

Debate resumed by Mr Keenan who moved, as an amendment—That all words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: “whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) calls for the provisions in the bill relating to managed investment trust income to be referred to the Senate Economics Committee for review, thereby enabling greater understanding of why the withholding tax regime should particularly favour foreign investors in property trusts; and
- (2) urges the Government to ensure that the provisions in the bill relating to the exemption of the Prime Minister’s Literary Award be put forward in a separate bill that can be dealt with more quickly”.

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

27 MILITARY MEMORIALS OF NATIONAL SIGNIFICANCE BILL 2008

Bishop, viz.*—That all words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: “whilst not declining to the give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) notes that the bill creates a new category of memorial—namely a Military Memorial of National Significance;
- (2) notes that this new category of memorial, unlike ‘National Memorials’ under the National Memorials Ordinance 1928:
 - (a) does not attract ongoing maintenance funding;
 - (b) must not be located in the national capital; and

- (c) involves a decision of the Minister and the Prime Minister rather than the bi-partisan Canberra National Memorials Committee;
- (3) acknowledges as correct the stance of the previous Government that National Memorials, pursuant to the 1928 Ordinance, can only be located in the national capital; and
- (4) condemns the Government for:
 - (a) playing politics with the veteran community;
 - (b) claiming in the Budget Papers that it will declare the Australian Ex-Prisoners of War Memorial in Ballarat a national memorial when it has not done so; and
 - (c) misleading the veteran community by claiming to have met an election commitment to declare the Ballarat Memorial a national memorial, when the Government has failed to do so?—

Debate resumed.
